THE JAPANESE EMBASSY.

The company of Japanese, commissioned by the government of their empire to visit the United States for purposes connected with the new relations now being established between their country and our own, arrived at San Francisco on the 31st of March, per United States steamer Powhatan, by way of Honolulu, where they touched and spent a few days. While the ship was being overhauled at San Francisco, and supplied with coal and water preparatory to her departure for l'anama, the commissioners, with their attendants, visited the city, and were publiely received and magnificently entertained.

The commission consists of two principal ambassadors, princes of the highest rank among the nobility of the empire, and two associates who are nobles of nearly equal rank. These four constitute the emperor's council. They are accompanied by a suite of sixteen officers, three interpreters, and fifteen subordinates, making 72 in all. On arriving at Panama, they will proceed across the isthmus to Aspinwall, where the United States steamer Roanoke is expected to be in waiting to convoy them to Washington. . It is stated that they have many boxes of presents for this government in their possession. 
