The deceased was widely and favorable known for his legal acquirements and strict integrity of character, which obtained for him the confidence of the community in which he resided, who honored him with the appointment of Esquire, an office which he filled for over twenty consecutive years.

Daniel Vanaman, in early life, united himself with the M. E. For the West Jargey Ploneer, Buffale Correspondence. Burrato, May 21, 1869.

EDITOR PIONEER:-I propose, if agreeable to your views, to write you a short sketch of a ride from Bridgeton to Buffalo with some account of matters going on a this place.
