Jothe Law were placed in the Palace at Rome, while the candlestick and other spoils were kept in the Temple of Peace, the massive ruins of which are still to be seen near this burnt in the reign of Commodus, these treasures were not destroyed, for Anastasius mentions that, when Genseric entered Rome on the third year after the flight of Maximus, and carried off much spoil. Amongst the treasures then stolen were these sacred vessels brought by Titus from Jerusalem.
