2. Horses shall be judged not altogether by the speed, but in connection with the apparent durability, ease of movement, wind, beauty, worth, &c. No Horse to be admitted that has ever been driven on a bet. Horses in the first and second divisions will be examined by the judges at 1½ o'clock, in the ring. Colts and Fillies under the third division, will be brought into the ring for examination at 10 o'clock, A. M. No trotting allowed during the reading of the Premiums.

3. Competitors for Field Crops must give the Committee, before the 15th of September; in writing, over their signatures, a statement of the kind of crop, quantity and quality of the ground, time of planting, quantity and variety of seed, mode, time and expense of harvesting, yield and net profit of crop, under oath or affination, and attested by one witness.

4. Committees shall have the discretionary power of withholding Premiums if the articles exhibited do not merit them.

5. Animals or articles for which a distinct Premium has been awarded, cannot be put in competition must be on the ground by 9 o'clock, A. M., and remain until 4 o'clock, P. M. On all occasions they will be returned to the contributors unless otherwise directed. At 10 o'clock, A. M., the Committees will proceed to examine the articles and award Premiums.

7. The Plewing Match will take place on the day previous to the Exhibition.

8. The Resping and Mowing Match, will come off at such time and place as the Committee shall direct—due notice of which will be given.

ORIGIN OF NEWSPAPERS.

We are indebted to the Italians for the idea of newspapers. The title of the Gazettas was probably derived from Gazzera, a magpie or chatterer; or more probably from a farthing coin, peculiar to the city of Venice, called Gazetta, which was the common price of the newspapers. Another learned Etymologist is for deriving it from the latin Gaza, which would colloquially lengthen into Gazetta, signifying a small treasury of news. The Spanish derive it from the latin Gaza; and likewise their Gazatero, and our Gazetteer, for a writer of the Gazette, and what is peculiar to themselves, Gazetista for a lover of the Gazette.

Newspapers then took their birth in that principal land of modern politicians, Italy, and under the government of Venice. The first paper was a Venetian one, and only monthly; it was the newspayer of the government only. Other governments adopted the Venetian name for it, and from one solitary government Gazette we see the inundation of newspapers, with which we, in this country, are surrounded. Mr. Chalmers gives a curious particular of these Venetian Gazettes: 'A jealous government did not allow a printed newspaper, and the Venetian Gazetta continued long after the invention of printing, to the close of the 16th century, and even to our own days, to be distributed in manuscript." In the Florence library may be found thirty volumes of Venetian Gazettas, all in manuscript. Those who first wrote newspapers, the Italians called Menanti; because they intended commonly by these loose papers to spread about defamatory reflections, and on this account prohibited in Italy by Gregory 13th in a particular bull, under the name of Menantes from Latin Minantes, a threatening. Menage, however, derives it from the Italian Menare, which means to lead at large or spread afar.

Mr. Chalmers dispovers in England the first newspaper. He says it may gratify national pride to learn that mankind are indebted to the wisdom of Elizabeth, and the prudence of Burleigh for the first newspaper. The earliest newspaper is entitled "The English Mercurie," which was printed by authority, by her highness' printer 1588. These were extraordinary Gazettes not regularly published.

DEALING WITH THIEVES.

The following true story is told of Jacob Sheaf, Esq, a merchant of Portsmouth in former times:

A man had purchased some wool of him, which he had weighed and paid for, and Mr. Sheaf had gone into the back room to get change for a note. Happening to turn his head while there, he saw in a glass which swung so as to reflect the shop, a stout arm reach up and take from the shelf a heavy cheese. Instead of appearing suddenly and rebuking the man for his theft, as another would have done, thereby losing his custom forever, the crafty old gentleman gave the thief his change, as if nothing had happened, and then, under the pretence of lifting the bag, as if to lay it on the horse for him, took hold of it, and exclaimed: "Why, bless me, I must have reckoned

the weight wrong !" "Oh, no," said the other, "you may be sure you have not, for I counted with you." "Well, well, we won't dispute about the matter, it's so easily tried," said Mr, Sheaf, putting the bag into the scales again.—
"There," said he, "I told you so; knew I
was right—made a mistake of nearly twenty pounds; however, if you don't want the whole, you needn't have it; I'll take part out."

"No?" said the other, staying the hands of Mr. Sheaf on the way to the strings of the bag, "I guess I'll take the whole."

And this he did, paying for dishonesty by receiving the skim milk cheese for the price of wool. On another occasion Mr. S. missed barrel of pork. A few months after, a man asked the question: "Did you ever find out who took that

pork, Mr. Sheaf?" "Yes," was the reply, "you are the fel-low; for none but myself and the thief knew of the loss."

The fellow was detected by the shrewd dealer, who possessed the valuable faculty of knowing when to be silent.
