Important from North Carolina Secession from Secessia - A Provisional

Government Formed. Correspondence of the New York Tribune. HATTEBAS INLET, N. C., Nov. 18 -

Carolina, as represented in Convention at Hutteras, Monday, Nov 18, 1861. Be it ordained by this Convention. and it is hereby ordained and published by authority of the same:

were unanimously adopted:

I. That this Convention, on behalf of the people of North Carolina, and acknowledging the Constitution of the United States, of Ame, i a as the supreme law of the land, hereby declares vacant all State offices, the incumbents of which have disqualified themselves to hold them by violating their oaths to support the Federal Constitution. II. That the office of Governor of this

Commonwealth having been vacated by the death of John W. Ellis, and by the active treason to the Union of his constitutional successor, Acting Governor Clark, therefore Marble Nash Taylor be hereby appointed and declared Provisiond Governor of North Carolina.

III. That the Constituion of this State and its amendments, together with the statues and laws thereof, as contained in the revised Code put in operation Janua ry 1, 1856, be declared continued in full force; also such subsequent acts of the General Assembly as were not adopted n contravention of the National Constitution, or in derogation of its authority

IV. That the ordinance of the Conrention which assembled at Raleigh on the 20th of May last, p oclaiming the Se cession of this Commonwealth from the Federal Union, such Secession being le gally impossible, is of no force or effect; and said ordinance, together with all oth er ordinances and acts of said Convention, or of the General Assembly, made and done in pursuance of the treasonable purposes of the conspirators against the D. Shiner, both of Crumpton, M. D. Union, is hereby declared ab initio null and void.

V. That whereas it is desirable that this State shall be represented in the Federal Congress, and maintain her due weight in the councils of the Union, therefore the Provisional Governor be di rected hereby to order special elections, in accordance with Chapter 69 of the Revised Code, as soon as practicable and John Craexpedient, in any district or districts his age. now unrepresented. 
