UNITED STATES DIRECT TAX. The direct tax assessed upon the value of all real estate in the United States, to raise the annual sum of twenty millions of dollars, has been overlooked by many persons...

On the first of January, 1861, the indebtedness of the State was \$164,752.83, having decreased during the past year the sum of \$27,260.43.

The Treasurer's report will give you the details of the transactions in his department.

In my last annual message the attention of the Legislature was directed to certain retrenchments which it was thought advantageous to make.

I would direct your attention to the report of the Superintendent of Public Schools, from which you will learn that considerable progress has been made in the educational interests of the State.

The Normal School continues to meet satisfactorily the objects for which it was established, and being judiciously managed, enjoys the public confidence.

In the Institutions for deaf mutes at New York and Philadelphia, there are twenty-seven pupils receiving instruction at the expense of the State.

In the Blind Asylums at New York and Philadelphia there are nineteen pupils, supported from the fund appropriated by the Legislature for that purpose.

My views respecting our Penitentiary system, and of what was needed to render it more perfect, were so fully explained in my last annual message, that I forbear at this time to say anything further on the subject.

The demand for enlarged accommodations for the State Prison is so urgent, that notwithstanding the attention of the Legislature was called to it by my immediate predecessor, and in my last annual message, I venture again to remind you of this pressing necessity.

In the month of July last, Sir Henry Hardinge, her Majesty the Queen of Great Britain's Advocate General in causes Ecclesiastical and Maritime, sent to me as a gift to the State, the original commission of Governor Franklin of New Jersey, issued September, 1762.

It is recommended that an act be passed authorizing the Treasurer of the State, with the advice of the Governor and Attorney General, to submit to the Supreme Court for determination any matter of difference that may at any time exist between the State and any incorporated company bound by law to pay to the State a tax or transit duty.

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Gentlemen of the Senate and General Assembly: As loyal citizens we have had much to deplore during the year that is past, yet considering the condition of our own State, we find much to be thankful for.

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
