DRYDEN, March 10 1862. All is peace and quiet here, there is to report from this quarter. Who will be excited to read anything else? Have Fern's diffuse descriptions of everything at home? Shall one who can neither make poetry nor write novels, make up a

report of an hour in a mill? Like a curious child I wander through from the base to the attic of the magpears like a vast dim cave planted thick with stout supports and conveyors. Caends lap or sheathe in each other, through which the corn in streams is rattling down with a constant hissing sound, like showering hail. Here too, the shipping is emptied of grain or laden with flour .-Going up stairs on the second floor, I find six or eight run of stone supplied with grain, which comes oozing from a gage along - conveyors from the ample stores above. From the hopper the grain passes through a little patent cleaner into the stone. The flour after being carried to the bolters returns to this floor. where three men are engaged in packing it. One barrel is filled, weighed, head ed up and rolled away in about every minute. These barrels, (according to my former report,) are made in the country, and brought here, one hundred and fifty in each load, and rolled in upon this floor. After being filled the barrels are taken to a platform, where, by the touch of the hand to some machinery they are quickly lowered through one or two floors for either storage or shipment. On the floor of the third story are the extensive bins. Here I find some persons the boats. Forty iron weights of sixty are lifted; one jerk and in a second al-

The fourth story is but a dismal expanse full of piles of fleecy bran as pourhall are naked posts, braces, conveyors and shafts running upright, horizontally and obliquely, while rumbling wheels and rattling grain within the cases, re ceivers, and dischargers have no rest.

Up in the fifth story I find the top of the great elevator cases, reaching down to the lowest hold of the shipping. This is a double case, inclosing a wide strap running with buckets or cups, for taking the grain from the hold of vessels and raising it aloft for distribution in the re positories of the mill. Attached to the beams in the end of this upper chamber, is a sliding frame work, from which the elevators are suspended, and by which they can be easily raised or lowered some twenty feet by a great cable passing over pullies five-fold and then around a windless; thus the apparatus can adjust the elevator to various depths of vessels while in the operation of unloading. mer and wires attached, by means of which, the manager from below gives his directions to the engineer above, in language similar to a captain's communication in steamboat management.

There are fourteen spacious mills such as this, all nearly joined in a vast block fronting the harbor, and forming magazines for grain, whose towering elevators leaning out from the upper chamber to the water, are the requisites for unloading the vessels of grain brought here in knife blade made a scratch upon the marimmense quantities. There are some ele vators placed on crafts to float among the shiping, for transferring grain from one vessel or boat to another, or from lake crafts to canal-boats in any part of the harbor. And several other mills quite as magnificent, are situated a few miles up the Oswego river at several points along the canal.


