Laws of New Jersey. A further supplement to the act entitled "An

act constituting courts for the trial of small causes," approved April sixteenth, one thousand eight hundred and forty six. 1. Be it enacted by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey, That if either pariy from an appeal to the court for the trial of small causes shall desire to pro-duce upon the trial thereof, in the court of common pleas, any witness or witnesses not produced or sworn in the court below, or any locumentary evidence not offered or admitted in the court below, the said party shall be at liberty to do so, and the same shall be admitted by the court, if otherwise legal and competent, provided, that the court of common pleas shall be satisfied that the said evidence was not withheld on the trial below for any unfair or fraudalent purpose; and provided, that the party first offering such new evidence shall have given the opposite party or his attorney twenty days' notice thereof in writing, setting forth the substance of such evidence and the names of the witnesses intended to be 2. And be it enacted, That this act shall

take effect immediately.

That any railroad company which shall construct any railroad by virtue of powers granted in their charter by this State, may, in crossing any public highway for the purpose of making said nighway pass over or under said railroad at an easy and suitable grade, alter the location of said highway at their own expense, so far as shall be necessary to make said high-way pass over or under said railroad at such grade, and such alteration shall be valid and of the same effect as if made by surveyors of the highways according to law, and all alterations heretofore made in any public highway in this State by any such railroad company for the purpose and in the manner aforesaid, are hereby confirmed and made valid as in the

And be it enacted, That if any railroad company shall refuse or neglect to comply with either of the foregoing provisions, they shall forfeit for every such refusal or neglect the sum of one hundred dollars to any person who may sue for the same, to be recovered, with costs, in an action of debt in any court having cognizance thereof.

An act to prevent the fraudulent transfer of property and to facilitate the collection of just claims.

Be it enacted by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey, That in all cases where a married woman transacts any business or purchases any property, and lebts or claims thereby remain unsatisfied, it shall and may be lawful for any person holding any such debt or claim to institute a suit for the recovery of the same in any court of law in this State against the husband and wife, or against the survivor in case one of them be dead, and to proceed to final judgment therein the same as in other actions, and such judgment so obtained shall bind the property that

may be held by such married woman.

2. And be it enacted, That it shall and may on the property, real or personal, of the defendants, or either of them, and shall proceed such execution, according to the directions of

the execution. 3. And be it enacted, That the fact of one of the parties being a a married woman, shall not in any wise be allowed as a defence in any such suit or any of the proceedings.

What Coal Ashes Are Good For. From its convenience and superior safety hard coal will be likely to form the chief article of fuel in all cities and towns that are accessible by railroad or water communication with the coal beds. The ashes are frequently thrown into corners of the yard or garden in slovenly heaps until the accumulation becomes a real nuisance. Coal is a vegetable production.. The ashes therefore contain a per cent of fertilizing matter, not sufficient perhaps to pay the expense of carting very far for light soils, but very valuable for heavy clay land. Coal of first quality leaves but little besides ashes. The coarse cinder taken from that of inferior quality makes excellent paths, which is something of a desideratum around farm houses in wet weather. The ashes applied to heavy or low wet laud tends materially to loosen the soil, incerase its productiveness and make-it more easy of cultivation. Enough such spots are in the vicinity of every town and village to absorb profitably all the coal ashes made in it for years. Farmers are frequently "in town" with their teams, and without any additional expense and but little additional labor equid transfer these ash heaps to their own lands with profit to themselves, and relief to the yards of the townspeople, and thus both parties be benefitted.


