#### Hoeing Wheat.

A farmer in Michigan has been trying the experiment of hoeing his wheat between the drills. He claims that on heavy land it will yield from twenty five to thirty per cent. more. He was so well satisfied with the experiment that he has invented a machine for performing the work by horse power. ### EVACUATION OF YORKTOWN.

Rebel Army in a Panic. McClellan After Them at Full Speed.

HEADQUARTERS ABMY OF THE POTOMAC, } May 4th, 10 A. M.
