EVACUATION OF YORKTOWN.
Rebel Army in a Panic.
McClellan Arrives at Fall Speed.
HEADQUARTERS ARMY OF THE POTOMAC, May 10, 10 A. M.
This morning at 5 o'clock our correspondent entered the enemy's works which the rear of their army deserted four hours before. Everything was found to be in utter confusion, as though they had in great haste evacuated the place. The pieces of heavy artillery have been left in their works, after being spiked, together with a large amount of ammunition, medical stores, camp equipage, tents, and private property of their officers.

Retreat from Williamsburg.
The army has retreated from Williamsburg and is now at Yorktown. The battle of Williamsburg was very severe, and the loss of the rebels proved to have been large.
To Hon. Edwin M. Stanton, Secretary of War: I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 7th inst. regarding the evacuation of Yorktown. The conduct of our men has been excellent, with scarcely an exception: The enemy's works are very extensive and exceedingly strong, both in respect to position and the works themselves. Our loss was heavy in Hooker's division, but very little on other parts of the field.

The War News.
We re-still with the expected tidings of a trial of strength between the Union and rebel forces near Corinth, and considerable uncertainty prevails as to the position of the rebel forces. Gen. Beauregard has received westward to Memphis, and others that he has gone southward to Grand Junction, where he will make a stand. On Sunday last Gen. Bragg made a speech to his troops, assuring them that it was the intention of Gen. Beauregard to give battle at Corinth, where he was daily receiving heavy reinforcements. On the 5th inst., Gen. Halleck arrived at Memphis, with a hearing of the beat of the drum and whistle of locomotives at Corinth. It is plain that this proximity must soon bring on a battle, unless the enemy retreats.

Latest News from General McClellan's Army.
CONTINUED & SUCCESSFUL PROGRESS.
BALTIMORE, May 8.—The following is furnished by the special correspondent of the American, dated Yorktown, Va., Tuesday, May 7, 1862. At two o'clock to-day, as I close my letter, the latest intelligence received from the field of battle is that General McClellan has come up with the enemy about three miles beyond Williamsburg, and after a pretty severe skirmish with his rear, has again put him to flight across the Chickahominy Creek.

Joint Resolutions relative to the defenses of the States of New Jersey, Pennsylvania and Delaware.
1. Be it resolved by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey, that the government of the United States be, and it is hereby enacted, that to insure the prompt and efficient execution of the laws, to provide suitable and sufficient defenses for the Delaware river and bay, and the harbors thereof, by the construction of gunboats and other improvements, and to provide for the enablement of the government of the United States to enter upon and complete the said work immediately, Congress is requested to authorize a special loan for that purpose, and that this state will unite with the States of Pennsylvania and Delaware in taking the whole of said loan, in the following proportion, to wit: the State of Pennsylvania, one-third; the State of New Jersey, one-third; and the State of Delaware, one-third, in the proportion of the representation of each in the House of Representatives of the United States.

Raising Cotton.
It is said that the Illinois Railroad Company have prepared two thousand acres of land for the purpose of planting it with cotton. It is certainly a very interesting experiment, and one which has not been generally successful, it is not fully demonstrated that a crop may not be successfully raised. In the cases tried, the seed used has come from a region too far south. In Arkansas and Missouri a harder kind called the green seed cotton has been raised, which would be more likely to thrive here than that from seed brought from South Carolina or Georgia. The commissioner of Patents in a recent circular, says, that the attempt to acclimate the Sea Island cotton, such as is now brought from Hilton Head, would prove a failure in any of the Free States. It is a principle in vegetable physiology that tropical plants can only be acclimated at the North by repeated reproduction of new varieties from the seed. If those who have succeeded in raising a few bales, would plant the best of their seed, this year and so continue year after year, a kind might probably be produced in a short time that could be successfully and profitably cultivated here. The Commissioner is of opinion that the green seed variety can be cultivated in the Middle States, and that seed should be procured from those States. We should suppose that now was the proper time to plant, so as to have the full benefit of the whole season for maturing the crop. The size of the plant and the length and the fineness of the fibre are so dependent upon the soil and climate as to render all speculations upon it very uncertain. Let us have a fair trial and see what Jersey can do.

Important from New Orleans.
DESPATCHES FROM THE FLEET.
THE GUN-BOAT VERONA SUNK.
New York, May 7.—The following is additional by the Columbia, which arrived from Havana to-day.
The U. S. gunboat Daniel Smith left Port Jackson, Mississippi River, at 2 P. M. on the 24th, and brings despatches for Washington, which go out in the Columbia to-night.
On the 15th the attacked commenced, and on 23d Com. Farragut, in the Hartford, accompanied by 13 steamers passed the forts, and Gen. Butler landed 4,000 soldiers above them; on the 24th a flag of truce was sent Com. Porter to ask the condition of a surrender. "None, it must be at discretion," we are told was the worthy Commodore's reply.
