THE GENERAL TAX LAWS of the STATE OF NEW JERSEY

Explanations and Instructions ATTORNEY GENERAL.

INSTRUCTIONS AND EXPLANATIONS TO THE ASSESSORS OF THE STATE.

I .- THE GENERAL PLAN of assessing and collecting taxes in Now Jersey is as foilows:

The assessor of each township or ward makes a list
or abstract of taxable persons and property in his

Camp Correspondence. Camp of the 7th Reg't N. J. Volunteers. 1 Near Cumberland, Va., May 18, 1862.

DEAR BROTHER: to be brief, for this (a-half sheet) is all the paper I have. We lost our knapsacks, and everything except what we had on our backs, and money is of no use here yet, for there is nothing to buy; only once in a while some sut-ler gets a barrel of crackers, which he sells at 25 cents per lb., and Tobacco \$1 per plug. But I must speak of our contest, although it makes me feel sad every time 1 mention it; for it renews the recollection that one of our num-ber still lies beneath the battle ground. O! how we miss him. When the battle commenced, six of us Cedarville boys stood side by side in the front rank. At night one lay dead on the field, and two in the hospital wounded. Three came out without a scratch, although ! had three bullet holes through my overcoat cape: I did not know that poor Elmer had fallen, or that Lorenzo Paynter and Albert Bateman were wounded until night. One don't notice much that takes place around him in such a time as that. After the battle was over I began to enclire where our boys were, for I had not seen any of them except Jos. Burt. for he saw him fall; and that A. Bateman was wounded before he fired a gun, and L. Paynter was also slightly wounded. This was sad news to hear. Sleep was impossible, for we were wet to the skin. We had nothing to eat but a few hard crackers. A sensible relief has resulted from the master y manner in which Gon. Banks has rescued the small bigg of men under his command from the laws of danger Great anxiety had been occasioned by fears that his defeat at Front Royal had been more dissertous than the telegraphic messages admitted, and it seemed possible that the overpowering numbers of the enemy might out off his retreat, and expose Bal'imore and possibly Washington itself to their attack. Fortunately these speculations have all been put at rest by the facts. Gen. Banks has saved his army, and by interposing the Potomac between it and the enemy, relieves us of all fears for the safety of the national capital The enemy, like a tiger disappointed of his prey, is again retiring into his fastnesses, and may yet be taken in the toils, which his own rash exploits have prepared for

The temporary reverse to Banks' column, gave birth to a brood of frightful rumors, which authentic information proves to have been unfounded. Instead of McDowel being in retreat from Fredericksburg, he had advanced, on Sunday night, eight miles to the southward in the vicinity of Bowling Green, which is on the direct road to Richmond, without meeting any resistance from the rebels. who abandoned their camps on his approach. A reconnoissance made for fifteen miles in advance of Fredericksburg. in one direction, and ten miles in another. revealed no rete's at all nor were there any indications of their presence in any force. It is probable that they have all been withdrawn to Richmond, and that Gen. McDowell is now rapidly marching to join the great army of McClellan before that devoted city.

From General McClellan, we bave very few items of intelligence. His aim seems to be to surround Richmond on all sides to the northward of the James river. and when the gunboats shall have arrived 7 50 to cut off their retreat in that direction, to converge upon it from every side and force the rebel army to capitulate.
