MR. EDITOR:-Having had a refreshing shower during the night, we feel quite refreshed this Sabbath morning; and seize this opportunity to write you a few lines. In my last I left you at the end of our retreat, since that time we have had a full trial of our patience and endurance, for we have had to dig trenches, fall timber, besides plenty of guard duty, and in consequence many of the mon are worn out and sick. Our Regiment was able a few days ago to turn out on inspection two hundred men. Company F. had on that occasion 13 privater, 3 non-commissioned officers. When off duty our minds are constantly disturbed by the momentarily expectation to be ordered out for fatigue. ### THE MILITIA LAWS.

The act of Congress under which the Presdent called for 300,000 militia, was passed July 16, 1862, and the provisions of the first sections are as follows:—
"That whenever the President of the United States shall call forth the militia of the States be employed in the service of the United States, he may specify in his call the period for which such service will be required, not exceeding nine months; and the militis so called shall be musterd in and continue to serve for and during the term so specified, uless sooner discharged by command of the President. If, by reason of defects in existing laws, or in the execution of them in the several States, or any of them,, it shall be found necessary to provide for enrolling the tions; and the enrollment of the militia shall in all cases include all able bodied male citizens between the ages of eighteen and forty
