

The question most concerning us, in the present serious juncture of gover mental affairs, is not what constitutes a citizen of our great Republic, but of since, and the inquiry would have had no significance. The matter would have no difficulties; but now, it concerns every man to adjust himself to this inquiry, and to determine for himself his exact governmental relationship.

Instead of one claimant upon our alle giance, as in the happier days of the Republic, we now have two. The first and oldest, being the order uninterruptedly following from the foundation of the Government, the other, a new and violent order of things, following a secessional or revolutionary condition; instituted from professed grievances as inter preted by a minority of the citizen power. The one is the expression of the ordained the expression, not of such formulas, but of an irresponsible and private interpretation of the source of these formulas, the Constitution itself. Now, of which am I a citizen? Of the Government naturally flowing from the established order | ject - A general summary of the course. of things, or of that which has been instituted in opposition, and that too without my participation or consent, and even against my judgment of right and expediency. Am I a citizen of the Government capitaled at Washington, or of the sesessional administration of Richmond. The settlement of this question is pressed upon every resident in city or country, from the St. Lawrence to the Rio Grande, from the Atlantic to the Pacific. It is not a question of men, nor of measures, but of personal governmental relationship. What is my connection, Mechanical supports, for the relief of what my allegiance? To what government do I now look as my protection, the protection of my wife, my children, my property, of my right to life, and the pursuit of business? Is it to Washington, or Richmond? Where do my sweetest memories linger, and from whence is my love of country most outraged?-Where centers my hope of a re established order, which will give back to me, and to my posterity, the rich, civil and religious legacy left me by revolutionary our free and incomparable constitution, and to all the world? Are they at Washington, or are they at Richmond?

"O my country, 'tis of thee,

Sweet land of liberty," Whose centre is Washington, whose circumference is from sea to sea, and from coldest North, to hottest South-I am a citizen. I know no other, as it is the creation of the popular will, in continuous succession, from the immor tal Washington until now. Here is my connection, here I owe my natural or voluntary allegiance, here I look for the protection of all that is dear to me, of life, family, business, and privilege. Here my sweetest memories linger, and here are the men to whom, under God. I most sincerely and willingly confide all I hope from our free, and glorious constitution. I am a citizen of the Old Republic; a child of America; a branch of the oid vine of the Union. It is now no time to dispute about questions involving the elementary principles of our Government, but as this issue has been made, not upon the floor of our national Congress-but upon the battle field by revolutionists, we must, I must inquire, for my citizen duties. Is this a time for me to break the chest. It is constructed scientifically upon with the old and tried Government? Is it now that I may play off from any responsibility? Is it now that I can find it in my heart to hunt up complaints, or use when the spine is unsupported. Banlisten to charges against my old protector, and thereby excuse myself from sharing in her concerns, or assisting her in her trials? Have I settled the question of citizenship, and am I at least practically consenting to this relation even now: do I mean to owe allegiance here and only here in any event? Latest War News.

The rebel steamer Alabama, or ' No. 290" adjourned Thursday. Nothing of special under Captian Semmes, has excepted from Massau, and been operating among the West orn isles. She had captured 34 men, five American Whalers and a Schooner. The Whalers were burned. Contributions to the Whalers were burned. Contributions to the amount of \$16,000 have been paid to the "Southers Club" in England for the relief of Southern prisoners in Union hands. The new Whitworth Shell weighing 131 pounds had proved successful; at 800 yards it passed through a formidable iron and wood target and afterward exploded with terriffic force. Gen. Bosecrans had been recalled from pursuing the rebels from Corinth. He returned on the 10th, and reports the enemy dispersed and so demoralized as to be incapa-ble of further mischief. Gen. Rosscrans had intended following them up to prevent another concentration, believing that now is the time o destroy them. The rebels abandoned and spiked eleven guns, three calssons were destroyed, and most of their ammunition and baggage trains captured. Our victory is incontestably one of the clearest of the war .-The enthusiasm of the army for Rosencran is boundless. Altogether we have 2,000 prisoners, including nearly 100 officers, besides the wounded about 1,000 rebels were killed. Our loss was 350 killed and 1,200 wounded. Accurate reports cannot be given until the victorious army returns to Corinth.

Capture of Longstreet's effects.




