MR. EDITOR:-If our readers will think for a moment they will remember that Sunday, the 26th day of Oct., was a very disagreeable day-the wind blew a gale, and the rain fell in torrents; and in the midst of all this we heard that familiar bugle-call, "saddle up," and in half an hour after, it sounded "to horse," and we were off. Many were the conjectures as to our destination; we sup posed that another raid had been made by Stuart's cavalry, and that we were to pursue him, find him, and then give him time to escape before an attack was made But we were all mistaken; we marched directly to Berlin, where an elegant pontoon bridge had been erected, and, after pass through Chester Gap, but we found some little delay, we succeeded in crossing, and marched to Lovetteville without meeting any of the enemy.
