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The following Essay was written for the Preachers' Association of the Bridgeton District, which met in Salem, N. J., May 12, 1863.

It is sent for publication in compliance with the request of the meeting, as expressed in the following resolution, which was unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That Brother Hitebe be requested to furnish a copy of his Essay on "The Discipline as to bribery at Elections," for publication in the Christian Advocate and Journal, and in the Salem and Bridgeton papers.

The subject of the following Essay is—"The Discipline in regard to bribery at elections." What the Discipline teaches on this subject, is found in the 8th Section of the 2d Chapter.

"Extirpate bribery, receiving anything directly or indirectly for voting at any election; show no respect of persons here in, but compel all that touch the accused thing, and strongly advise our people to discontinue all treats given before or at elections, and not to partake, in any respect, of such iniquitous practices."

The penalty which the law is enforced is the highest which it is in the power of the people to inflict,—"show no respect of persons here in, but compel all that touch the accused thing."

It is a crime clearly condemned in the word of God. In that it is classed with other and grievous sins. The charge against the sons of Samuel was that "they turned after lacer and took bribes, and prevented judgment, (1 Samuel 8: 3.) David says, "I rather not my soul with sinners, nor my life with bloody men, in whose hand is mischief, and their right hand is full of bribes." (Ps. 26: 9-10.)

It is a self-debasing and a self-degrading crime. When God created man He designed him to occupy a high and elevated position—to exhibit, in some degree, his own intellectual and moral excellencies.

Fourth, It is a sin which strikes at the very foundations—the very life of our free and benign institutions. Of all the evils which threaten the overthrow of our Republican Government, there are none so great as political bribery.
