THE "AIR LINE" RAILROAD.

The New York influence in our Legislature is trying to get it to instruct our Senators and Representatives in Congress to go in favor of a new postal and military road between that city and Washington. Our Legislature should not do anything of the kind. It should mind its own business. If the general Government feels the necessity of having a new military railroad, it dose not need to be told so by our State Legislature. It is a remarkable feature of this scheme that it does not originate with the General Government, the party as alleged most to be benefitted, but comes from New York speculators, backed by resolutions from the New York Legislature, which is controlled by such persons, and who are now endeavoring to control ours - Phila. Led-

In connection with the above, we suboin an original article, furnished us by gentleman thoroughly conversant with the "Air Line" scheme of the New York Brokers, and who, as will be seen, agrees with us in the opinion that it would be unwise and impolitic in Congress to thus set aside Sta e Legislation, for no other reason than to oblige a few Wall street stock jobbers. In 1854, the Legislature of New Jersey authorized the construction of a railroad from some suitable point on the Raritau Bay, eastward of the village of Keyport, in the county of Monmouth, to the village of Toms' River, in the county of Ocean; and thence through the counties of Ocean and Burlington, to May's Landing, in At- ings. lantic County; thence through the counties of Atlantic and Cape May, to Cape Island, on the Atlantic ocean." The expressed object in obtaining such charter, was to construct a coast road through that section of the State, and it met the hearty approval of all parties. In a few years a and she feels perfectly competent to conportion of the road was constructed and in operation; but not proving remunerative, it was sacrificed to a clique of New York speculators and stock-brokers, who are operating to make it a profitable spculation. To this end, they entered into an agreement with the Camden and Atlantic road for the privilege of running the Delaware and Raritan Bay cars over the former to and from Canden, and thus in defiance of the laws of the State and in violation of their charter, became a competing road with the Camden and Amboy Company for the transportation of trade and travel between New York and Philadelphia cities. While the connecting branches were building, the Joint companies believing the intention to be an infringement of their rights, made application to the Chancellor for a preliminary injunction against their proceeding, which was refused on the ground that he defendents disavowed any intention of using the connected road for through business. Despite this disavowel, they had no sooner completed the track, than they sought by every means in their power to divert the through business over their line. As soon as this becomes apparent, a supplemental bill was filed charging the facts and demanding the interposition of the Court. Proofs were taken and the cause argued on final bearing in November and December last. The Chancellor, in February, gave his decision, sustaining the claim of the plaintiffs to the through business, declaring that the defendents were infringing that right, ordering an injunction to prevent their doing it in future, and decreeing that they should account to the plaintiffs for the business hey have done.

The stock speculators who control the Delaware and Raritan Bay road, aware of the deception they had been practising on the Court, and the illegality of their ourse, evidently auticipated the decision of the Chancellor, and changed their tacies accordingly. INCORPORATION OF BRIDGETON.

We have given publication to a number of articles, both pro and con, relative to the incorporation of Bridgeton, and, judging by the tenor of the major part, the public feeling leans very decidedly in favor of the measure. The main point, sought to be made against it, was upon the score of economy and the phantom of big dinners and New York extravagances-was conjured up as the inexorable destiny of every little town that dared aspire to the privileges of a corporated body. Towns of much smaller size than Bridgeton have been incorporated, and, as they have not been obliged to indulge in extravagant prodigality, we do not know why the dignitaries of Bridgeton should be compelled to plunge our embryo city into the vortex of extravagance. Apart from this source of prodigality, and which, if real, could easily be remedied, by electing prudent and discreet men to the city council, the expenses might really be less than they are now. First, because, instead of two sets of officers, as now required by the two townships of Bridgeton and Cohansey, one set, not numerically superior to either, would be sufficient, and the salaries of the other set, if paid out of the public treasury, saved. Second, The mayor and councilmen are not, in small towns, salaried officers. Enough patriots have always been found quite willing to sacrifice their time to the service of the country, even upon these terms. The mayor, having the power of a magistrate, draws a small amount of fees from that source. Third, any incorporated city derives a revenue, now lost to it, from the issue of licenses, and this brings with it the right to the corporation, through its own chosen officers, to determine what shall and what shall not be licensed within its limits. thus putting it in the power of the citizens to withhold the license for any thing deemed detrimental to its interest or good order. A comparison of the expenses of the

city of Salem with those of Cohansey and Bridgeton townships, for the current year, argues very strong in favor of a city corporation. The ordinary expenses of the city of Salem for the year 1863, were \$4,330.06. The appropriations of Cohansey and Bridgeton townships for the current year, for the ordinary expenses of the two townships, amount to \$6,212.50. So that after making all allowance for excess of population, incorporation does not necessarily increase the expenditures an adequate reserve force for all continof a place. On the contrary, situated as Bridgeton is, the probability is, that expense would be a small per cent. less.

Waiving, for the present, other reasons, these seem, to us, to more than answer the objections against incorporation, and, on the score of economy, to incline strongly in its favor.

Results of Sherman's Expedition. Owing to the absence of official accounts from Genr Sherman's expedition, false ru-mots have been diligently circulated of the losses su-tained by our troops in their enormous raid of 400 miles, occupying 24 days. Full accounts from correspondents with the expedition, now establish that our total loss did not exceed 150 in killed, wounded and prisoners, while the dam age inflicted upon the enemy is more than fifty millions of dollars, 200 killed and wounded, and over 800 prisoners, besides six or seven thousand contrabands liberated, and an incalculable amount of stores and other valuable materials secured. The quota of New Jersey, under the late call of the President for 500,000 men, is 16,759 .-Upon this quota will be credited and deducted all volunteers from this state, who have been mustered into the United States service since the first day of June, 1863, and also all who shall be so mustered, prior to the 1st day of March, 1864. More than ten thousand (10,000)

men have been already recruited on account of The sob districts that have raised the quotas assigned them in the General Oorders issued from the office of the Adjutant General of this State, under my Proclamation of 27th July, 1863, and 22d October, 1863, are not liable to the draft ordered to be made on the 10th day

By referring to previous publications of quo tas, the deficiency of the various sub-districts not yet exempt will be very nearly ascertained. The Adjutant General will announce the exact deficiency as soon as possible. The Government bounty of \$300 for new recruits and \$400 for veterans will not be paid

after the expiration of the present month. . I

earnestly call upon the people of those townships and wards, where deficiencies exist. to devote all their energies to filling their respective quotas, before the large Government bounties now offered are withdrawn. Believing that the people of New Jersey desired to avoid a draft, I have labored to give them the opportunity to furnish volunteers.— The greater part of the State is already exempt. There is yet time for each township and ward to fill its entire quota if the peeple will be

earnest in the effort. The advantage of such, especially to the laboring classes, have been more than once presented. I can add but little to the appeals already made. I leave the sub-ject with the people, in confidence that their responce will be such as will gladden the heart fevery Jerseyman.
