The mint at Philadelphia is ready to be gin to issue the one and two cent pieces to be anthorised by an act already through They are to be made of a compositionninety five per cent of copper and five per cent of tin and zinc, and the reason for the adoption of this new allow is nickel has now become scarce, and is so high that a cent of the old kind costs the government more than a cent, and besides nickel is objectionable as an alloying metal and not repulse at the mist. The property piece is about the size of the nickel cent, but handsomer, and with more of a bronze look. The weight of the cent is one-tenth of an ounce troy, and of the two cent piece twice as much or one-fifth, the comosition in both being alike. The act authorizing this new coinage makes it an offence, with \$1000 fine and imprisonment, for any individual to issue coins intended to pass as money, and the effect ought to be to retire those cents issued by private

How PRICES ARE RAISED .- A cotemporary remarks with much truth that Congress proposes a duty on cotton of two cents a pound whereupon all the small dealers in spool cotton propose to advance the price one cent upon each spool. Now as a pound of raw cotton will make over one hundred spools of sewing cotton, it is not easy to appreciate the justice of this large advance in the price of a very necessary and important article in daily use .-But, while it is not easy to appreciate this fact, it is but characteristic of the advance in prices upon two-thirds of the articles in daily use. Just hint at a tax of any kind, and forthwith the price is put up to 20; 30, 50, and 100 per cent. The rule is to put on the price once when the tax is proposed, and once more when it is passed. And if the duty fails, the price is kept up.

Highly Inflammable Oils. An easy method of detecting dangerous oils, those which ignite at a low temperature, has been discovered by a medical gentleman of England. His method was exhibited at a recent meeting of a Health

Association, and is thus described: "Two tea cupfuls of boiling water and one of cold water (at the ordinary temperature of a sitting room) were mixed together in a small basin, a cupful of the mixture was dipped out and a teaspoonful of the oil to be tested poured upon its surface; in a few seconds a light was applied to the oil. The dangerous oils-those capable of igniting below a temperature of one hundred and twenty eight degreesimmediately took fire; whereas, it was shown to be impossible to ignite those that vere of a safe and non-explosive character. In the conversation that ensued, Drs. Letheby, Lankester, and R. D. Thomson took part, and the desirability of raising the standard of the petroleum act from one hundred degrees Fahrenheit to one hundred and twenty five degrees was discussed, many accidents having arisen from the employment of oils with a higher inflaming point than one hundred degrees."
