Teachers institutes are a potent instrumentality in importing a knowledge of improved and systematic methods of instruc-tion. Their efficacy," then, in elevating the character of the schools of the State, cannot but he acknowledged by every friend of public education. In order, however, that their power for good may be sensibly felt, they must be largely at-tended. The opposition to institutes heretofores has developed itself, not sao much because of the characteriof the instruction imparted, as because of the prevalling apathy amous teachers, and the consequent non-attendance of so large a number of those for whose benefit the institutes were establishedet postunit d

It cannot be expected that the State will expend one hundred dollars to defray the expenses of our lestitutes, when but a small proportion of the teachers manifest sufficient interest to attend it, and strive to improve themselves by a participation in its exercises. A reform in some counties is imperatively demanded; and, while the friends of education desire that an institute should be held in every county, and that it should be largely attended, they will agree with me that none should be hold, unless "at least forty, teachers," not only express a "desire" to receive instruction, but actually essemble for that purpose. It is hoped, therefore, that no teacher will sign a perittion saking that an institute be appointed for his county, unless he is positively desirous of attending it. The Cumberland Grays and the Army of the Potomac.

No words can fully express the gratitude which the people owe to the Army of the Potomac, in whose glory the Cumberland Grays so largely share. For three years have these patriotic and heroic men en dured the toils and privations of the sol diers's life. Some have fallen a sacrifice on battle fields, in hospitals and prisons; each of whose death has pierced the heart of a wife, a parent, a brother or sister. How inadequately do we realize the sufferings of those who have fallen in battle, with their wounds exposed to the piercing air, while the life-blood binds them to the earth, amidst the trampling of horses and the insults of an enraged foe! Far from their native home, no well known voice, no wife, or mother, or sister near to soothe their sorrows, relieve their thirst or close their eyes in death. And those who have not fallen in combat, think of their scanty diet, their exposure in all kinds of weather, the harassment of tiresome marches and perpetual alarms; and we can, in some measure, understand that a soldier's life is a continual scene of hard ship and dangers.

The men who have recently returned, some twelve, or fifteen in number, are the remnant of the Cumberland Grays who left this place one hundred strong. Of course all are not to be reckoned as killed or wounded who are missing from their thinned ranks, as some have been discharged for various disabilities. But to those who remain and are now with us. whole or maimed, we say, hail brave soldiers of New Jersey. We greet you with most hearty welcome to your homes.-During the last three years, by flood and by field, in the valleys and upon the monntain tops, you have bravely fought, bled and died for our common country, carrying the old flag from victory to victory. never shall your deeds be forgotten. All who see and know you will join in the benediction, "God bless the pure patriotism hallowing their sepulbrave man!"

We have spoken of the gratitude which the neuple owe to the army of the Potomac For overforty days and nights, now. it has either been fighting every day, or performing difficult and hurried marches, or counter-marches to execute some required manoeuver. Its nights have often been spent in battle, or in making some sudden movement to circumvent the enemy. It has borne heat and dust and wet, sleeping on the ground and without change of garments, enduring the most incessant fatigues ever borne by any army. We wonder not at the London Times, which hitherto has spoken contemptuously of our military powers, contrasting the arrules of other nations which become exhausted after one or two days battle, with this army that has fought and marched for over a month without overpowering weariness, or despondency, or exhaustion. Sergeant M. Bloomfield Holmes. The death of this truly excellent young man, and brave soldier, has cast a gloom over the whole community. Through the kind consideration of Lieutenant Edward M. Dubois, his family has been furnished with the following particulars of his death.

He was gallantly leading his company K, 12th, N. J., in the crossing by our army of the Chickshominy at Mechanics ville, on the 3d of June, when he was struck in the leg by a shell. Upon consultation by the Surgeons amputation was pronounced impracticable. He lingered until the next day, being able, in an interval of consciousness, to give directions as to his effects, and send messages of love to his family. Lieutenant Dubois adds, "the boys of his company buried him with more care than any Colonel has received who has died here." He further states, "Sergeant Holmes has commanded Co. K since the 6th of May, and led them into all the fights with the greatest coolness and bravery." But the crowning glory of the soldier's life is the closing sentence of the letter-" in one thing he was con spicuous; amid all the temptations of camp life he never swerved from the strict path of a consistent christ anity."

The death of such a christian and such soldier may well make a community sorrowful. In all the relations of life he came nearer the standard of a " perfect man" than any one we were ever acquainted with. For parents to be able to say of a son, seven and twenty years of age, that they never remember his disobeying them, or ever knew him to speak evil of any one, is testimony which can be given of few, very few, of frail humanity.

We well remember the alacrity with which he advanced to the field, believing that God himself mustered the host to war. He knew that while they were engaged in the field, many would repair to the closet, many to the sanctuary. The faithful of every name would employ that prayer which has power with God. And how it must have nerved his arm and fired his heart, in the reflection that the voice of intercession and supplication was mingling in its ascents to heaven with the shouts of battle and the shock of arms.

But he has fallen in the struggle for the Union and for Liberty. His name, with the mighty host who have offered up their lives on the alter of their country, will be enrolled with the most illustrious dead, while posterity, to the end of time, as often as they revolve the events of this period, (and they will incessantly revolve them) will turn a reverential eye. while they devoutly thank God for the tle fell when you ascended; and thousands inflamed with your spirit, have sworn by Him that sitteth upon the throne and liveth fir ever and ever, that they will protect freedom in her last asylum, and never desert that cause which you sustained by your labors, and cemented with your blood. And thou, sole Ruler among the children of men, to whom the shields of the earth belong, gird on the sword, thou Most Mighty - go forth with our host in the day of battle! Pour into their hearts the spirit of departed heroes! Iuspire them with thine own! Thus being led by thine hand, and fighting under the barners, may victory crown ous arms in the unconditional surrender of the rebels. and the utter and complete extirpation of Slavery from the soil of the Republic.

THE WAR IN KENTUCKY. CINCINNATTI, June 12 .- Morgan, with abou 8,000 men, attacked the 168th and 171st Ohio Regiments under Gen. Hotson at Cynthians. yesterday, and after a pretty severe fight, com pelled Hobson to surrender on condition that his men should be immediately exchanged. The fighting took place principally in the streets of Cynthians, and some of our troops took refuge in the court house In order to distodge them a stable near the hotel was set on fire and about twenty buildings comsemed before the fire was extinguished. Our loss was 15 killed and 50 wounded. Col. Benjamin, Provost Marshal of Covington, was mortally wounded, and Col. Garns, 168th Obio, severely wounded. It is also reported that Gen. Hobson was wounded. Our loss in prisoners was from 1,200 to 1,500. This morning, General Burbridge, who left

Paris last night, fell upon Morgan while his men were at breakfast, and after a very severe fight, completely defeated him, scattering his torces in every direction. Gen. Burbridge attacked Morgan at daylight on the morning of the 18th, and after an hour's hard fighting completely routed him, killed three hundred, and wounding nearly as many more, and capturing nearly four hundred prisoners, besides recapturing nearly all of Gen

Hobson's command, and over one thousan horses. Our loss in killed and wounded is about one hundred and fifty. Morgan's scattered forces are flying in all directions, have thrown away their arms and are out of ammunition and are wholly demoralized.

RAD NEWS FROM MEMPHIS

Defeat of General Sturgis—Destruction of his Ammunition and Artillery. Memphis, June 13 .- The expedition under General Sturgis, which left Memphis June list is returning. We learn from an officer that they met a large force of Rebels at Guntown, said to be ten thousand infantry and cavalry, inder command of Eurrest Lee and Roddy. This force attacked them suddenly and most desperate fight ensued, resulting in the defeat of General Sturgis, with the loss of his wagon and ammunition trains. This last was the most severe loss, as Sturgis ran out of ammunition and was obliged to destroy and aban don his artillery.






