John Hunter, one of the greatest anatomists of our own or any age. was a cabinet-maker's apprentice, and spent the first twenty years of his life without an education. Ben. Jonson, was a working bricklayer. Hans Sachs, a German poet of great fame, was a poor shoemaker. The great astronomer Herschell, was a poor musician attached to gerous. the Hanoverian guards. His name is now inscribed among the the planetary orbs.-

Thomas Simpson, the great mathemati cian, was a poor weaver. John Theden. who rose to be chief surgeon to the Prussian army, had been a tailor's apprentice. Paucton, an eminent French mathematician, was bred in such poverty, that he received scarcely any education until he reached his eighteenth year. Linnæus, the greatest naturalist of his day, was once seated on the shoemaker's bench. So great was the poverty of the great scholar Erasmus, while studying at Paris, that he was actually reduced to rags.

Now we have not cited these cases of men rising to eminence from early poverty, and obscurity of life, to prove Mr. Lincoln, and Mr. Johnson, the fittest men for the offices for which they have been nominated. We have no such object in view. The people will best decide on their merits or demerits. The whole thing was simply a bold game on the part of gold gamblers. The increase of thirty five per cent, in a few hours, was their desperate expedient. Nothing which occurred during the day con'd have legitimately increased the value of gold to the high figures which were at one time acked for it. If be the evidence either of their greatness or their the increase had been an honest one, nothing that afterwards happened could have caused it to sink twenty-six per cent! The entire effair was wanton, reckless, desperate.

It is contended by some that the passage of the Gold bill by Congress caused all the mischief. We believe no such thing The passing of that bill did catch some of the most unscrupulous at great disadvantage. But there was noteing in the bill per se to disturb the legitimate operators. Those parties who had made contracts for delivery upon time were the to pay duties with.

Plain people are no doubt puzzled to understand why the buying of gold should be different from the purchase of wheat or corn. It would not be if those gold speculators really sold and bought the article as the merchant sells and delivers his wheat and corn. But the evil of the whole business is that they sell, or pretend to sell, gold they have not got, and that they never intend to deliver; and the buyers purchase, or pretend to purchase, gold that they do not want, and never intend to recore. No gold ever passed in those operations. When settling day came round, if gold had gone down, the pretendel buyer paid the difference between his bid and the present price; if gold had gono up, the seller paid the margin between his contract price and the current rate.

The crisis is passed. The stringent provisions of the Gold bill will press steadily against these unprincipled gamblers. Let them be satisfied with their past ill-gotten gains. It is the last blow at public credit aimed by the expiring enemies of the Government. On Friday, the enemy opened on the 18th Corps with the caviest cannonade of the campaign, one hundred guns pouring a storm of shell against our wide thou and orphanage made such by the ous injury. During the day, an assault was bloody field of Pittsburg Landing—to care made on this Corps by Gen. Hoke's rebel brignought for the thousands of suffering comrades ate, about 400 of whom were suffered to enter aptured or killed. An attack on Gen. Burn side, also made on Friday, was similarly re-pulsed. The Petersburgh and Weldon Rail road has been under our guns for several days. On Friday the infantry tore up about five hun dred yards of the track, when they were com pelled to retire. The cavalry has destroyed nother important portion of this road further south at Reams Station, and is operating else where at this time. It is intimated that Longstreet and Hill are moving toward Weldon, paving vacated their entronchments on our in mediate front indicating a purpose to fight for the maintenance of the Southern lines which are now menaced by our forces. It is said that Petersburgh, is full of people, all the nhabitants within a radius of ten miles having ded to the c ty for shelter and provisions.

The War Department has received informa ion from Gen. Hunter's command, which, having fulfilled the mission upon which it was sent —the distruction of the Central Railroad in the vicinity of Stanton, of the Gordonsville and Lynchburg Railroad, and of an important poron of the James river canal—is successfully pressing forward to the point in Western Vir ginia to which he was ordered.

A despatch from Louisville informs us that on the morning of the 18th, the rebel General Wharton, commanding 2,500 men, captured and burned five freight trains loaded with supplies, on the railroad between Kingston and Dakton, Georgia. On the 20th, another force made a raid on the railroad five miles from Rescaca, and captured two freight trains with supplies. On the 19th three companies of the Fifty-fourth Virginia (rebel) came into our lines on the Chattahootchie, took the oath of allegiance, and were employed as teamsters and laborers. A camp of rebel conscripts six miles from Atlanta, on Friday last, broke for our lines. They numbered eight hundred, six

hundred of whom got in and remain.
There is but little additional intelligence from Gen. Grant's army. The enemy are said to be in very strong force in our front, exhibiting a determination to resist every attempt to occupy the Petersburg and Weldon Bailroal, portance. A recent reconnoisance discovered the enemy engaged in repairing the track destroyed last week by our infantry. An attack easily repulse i. our men holding an alvanced position, where intrenchments are constructing to cover the enemy's works. Gen. Sheridan's losses, in his engagement while marching from the White House to the James River, amount ed to 250. During the past week Gen. Gran has been reinforced by 10,000 convalescents
