WHY DOMINISTERS OF THE GOSPEL MEDDLE WITH POLITICS: Noah Webster defines politics to be The Science of government; that part of ethics which consists in the regulation and government of a nation or state, for the preservation of its safety, peace and prosperity; comprehending the defence of its existence and rights against foreign control or conquest, the augmentation of its strength and resources, and the protection of its citizens in their rights, with the preservation and improvement of their morals."

Politics, then, is concerned with all the material and moral interests of the citi-

zens of a country.
Since the outbreak of the present civil war, the ministers of the Gospel, at least some of them, have shown a disposition to interest themselves in the politics of the country by praying for the divine blessing upon the ruling authorities, and for the success of the government in its efforts to put down the slaveholders rebellion, and for the utter abolition of slavery by preaching what are called political to be sorely grieved lest the sacred office of the ministry should sink into disrepute, drafted must either go to the field themand the interests of religion should greatly reputation of the ministry are seldom seen in church, but may often be found at the drinking saloon, and the theatre; while others of them who are church members, are not generally the most intelligent, nor the most pious of all professors of religion. There is evidently a difference of opinion about the right of ministers to meddle with politics; for while, as above stated, some question this right, others equally as intelligent and pious, concede the right and insist upon its exercise. All honest men desire to know the truth, and are willing to look it squarely in the face. Now what is the truth in this case?-Which side is right? Have the ministers of the gospel, or have they not, the right in common with other men to interest themselves in the politics of this country? I purpose in this article, to consider this question, and in so doing, I shall take the side of the ministers and claim for them, that they have as much right as any other class of persons to interest themselves in politics; and for the reasons which follow, viz:--1. Ministers are men-human, not an-

gelic beings. And like other men, they have human feelings and sympathies. They have their likes and dislikes. They have to eat and dress, and live in houses, and pay their debts like other men. They generally have families, who are as dear to them as other men's families are to them. And they and their families are as much affected by good or bad government as others. Many of them have property like other men. And consequently whatever interests and affects other men, in like manner interests and affects them; for their interests for weal or woe are bound up with the interests of men in general. Besides, they possess as much intelligence as other men and are as likely as others to form correct judgments upon those matters which connect themselves with the general welfare of mankind. And perhaps it is not claiming too much for them to say, that they have as keen if not a keener sense of right and wrong as any other class of men; and especially that class of political partizans who never hesitate to uphold and defend any political villiany, which may promise to give power and prestige to their particular party. That ministers should be as likely as any other class of men, to have as intervals and wrong must be in their authority as public expounders conceded when we consider that it is of the word of God, for it is impossible their special business to study long and to do this without treating upon political carefully the volume of divine inspiration, in which God has so clearly laid down the distinction between right and wrong. 4. Ministers are Divinely appointed public expounders and teachers of the word of God, as contained in the Bible. At least, they claim to be such, and the laws of the land, and the mass of the people concede this claim to be well founded. This being true, it is their duty to God and man to fully explain and enforce all the doctrines and duties inculcated in the Holy Scripture, and thus lead public sentiment in the right direction to promote the interests of morality and religion, and advance the general good of mankind and

the glory of God. Now it so happens that the Bible, not only prescribes men's duties to God; as free, moral agents, but also their duties to their fellew-beings are mabers of civil society. And a very perceptible vein of politics runs through the whole Old Testament. While the most prominent and beautiful characters sketched therein were the leading politicians in their day; such as Abraham, Melchisadeck, Joseph and Moses, Samuel and David, Daniel and his three friends, to say noihing of many others. And even the most eminent prophets, such as Elisha Isaiah and the gentle, weeping Jeremiah to say nothing of Jonah and others, meddled extensively with politics. And turning to the New Testament wherein the the Gospel is most fully developed, we find that John the Baptist and Jesus meddled with politics, just about in the same way, and to the same extent that most ministers now do, making due allowance for the difference between the circumstances of the former and the latter. In examining the writings of St. Paul, we find that he touches frequently upon po

litical subjects, and especially in his letter to the Romans, in which he devotes the 13th chapter almost entirely to politics. St. Peter also deals with politics in his lettrs; and whoever reads carefully the Acts of the Apostles, and the Revelation pretty considerably mixed up therein. these very men, who so bitterly and persistently deny the right of ministers to meddle with politics, undertake to prove by that same bible, which these ministers are appointed to explain, that slavery, their last and only remaining political principle, is a divine institution, so sacred that its existence must be maintained. even at the sacrifice of national honor. The Postal Money-Order System. The postal money-order system, de-

signed to promote public convenience and to insure safety in the transfer of money through the mails, will, it is thought, go into operation on the first of November. Its advantages will no doubt be very great. The mode by which safety is secured consists in leaving out of the order the name of the payee or party for whom the money is intended. In this respect a money order differs from any ordinary bank draft postmaster to the postmaster at the office of payment. The latter is thus furnished with the necessary information, and will therefore be informed of the names of the remitter and payee before the order itself can be presented, and be enabled to detect fraud, if any should be attempted. The fees or charges for money orders will be as follows: For an order of one dollar or more, but not exceeding ten dollars, ten cents; for an order of ten dollars or more, but not exceeding twenty dollars, fifteen cents; for an order of twenty dollars or more, but not exceeding thirty dollars, twenty cents. Fraction of cents must not be introduced into any order. No money or business to be transacted on Sundays.

George, Sheldon, Agent for the American Bible Society, and on which occasion, one hundred and ten dollars were raised without any gress, Albert L. Lee, rep. extra effort for the Bible cause, he related the following among interesting statements having a bearing on the Bible cause:

"As an illustration of the effects of the circulation of the New Testament among the soldiers, the Rev. F. Rose, chaplain of a New Jersey regiment, states that two hundred of the six hundred in his regiment were converted last winter, and one hundred and fifty of the two hundred afterwards fell in battle, and that the fifty remaining had a powerful influence for good in the army.

The rebels, notwithstanding their bitterness towards the North; were desirous to have the word of God from the American Bible Society. They offered to pay for it at the close of the war, and in fact were now paying for it in cotton. 


