Now has Congress complied with the requirements of the article? Congress passed the proposed amendment by a two-thirds vote—that is known, it is history; and it chose, as it had a perfect right, to submit the amend-ment to the Legislatures of the several States.— The procedure, then, has been constitutional. But the gentleman from Middlesex (Mr. Goble) says that this is not an amendment, that it has nothing to do with the Constitution, that it is something which in nowise relates thereto, and about which the Constitution says nothing. His argument is extirely too narrow. The same objection can be raised against a majority of all the amondments that have ever been made to the instrument.
