His excellency the Governor of this State, by an official communication, has informed this Senate that an amendment to the Constitute of t tution is proposed by Congress in the follow-

Article 12th, Section 1. Neither Slavery nor involuntary servitude, except as a punishment for crime, whereof the party shall have been duly convicted, shall exist within the United States or any place subject to their jurisdiction.
Section 2. Congress shall have power to enorce this article by appropriate legislation. This is the momentous language addressed to us to-day, and this is the proposition we are called to consider. When we take into conconsideration, Mr. President, the full force and effect of this proposition upon the welfare and well-being of the whole nation, the radical change in the social condition of nearly one half of the States, the liberty or slavery of some four hundred thousands of human beings,

and the necessary reorganizing of society in all of the slave States, we are profoundly impressed with the importance of the subject before us. But, Mr. President, the time has arrived when you and I are forced to decide upon the question. The time has arrived when our own glorious little State may become the arbiter of our future destiny as a nation, and arbiter of our future destiny as a nation, and must declare herself either for or against liberty. REFORM SCHOOL.

Having received, through the kindness of Senator Ludlam, a copy of the very interesting report made to the Legislature by the committee appointed by Gov. Parker to consider the importance and necessity of the establishment, by the State, of an institution for the reformation of juvenile offenders, we shall endeavor to present to our readers some of the facts collected, the main points presented, and the conclusions reached by the committee. touching this highly important subject.

The State Teachers' Association at its annual meeting held at New-ducting Sabbath Schools, examples and Fairton, Brunswick, in December, 1863, with its accustomed zeal in all matters pertaining to the interests of the rising generation, having this subject under consideration, adopted the following resolution:

" Resolved, That this Association would most respectfully and earnestly urge upon the Legislature of this State, the importance of establishing a Reform-School for the detention and reformation of juvenile delinquents."

The subject was referred to a committee consisting of Haynes and Peckham, of Essex, and Travis, of Sussex, who were requested to memorialize the Legislature. This duty was faithfully performed by said committee, and they reported encouragingly at the last annual meeting of the Association held in December 1864, at Rahway. The subject was then and there discussed at some length by a number of the prominent, inducatial teachers of our State, among whom were Peckham, of Newark High School, Hedges of Newark, an aged veteran Cole, of Rutger's College. The committee was continued with the addition of Ilon. C. M. Harrison, State Superintendent, and Prof. Cole, and requested again to memorialize the Legislature. Gov. Parker, in his message, Jan. 1864, made the following remarks:

"Some place other than the State Prison should be provided for the incarceration of youth. This paragraph was referred to a joint comreported joint resolutions authorizing the appointment by the Governor of three commis sioners " to inquire into the character and influences of institutions in other States designed for the reformation of criminal or vagrant youth-to ascertain, if possible, the probable number of youth whose course of life demands the care of the State, and the manner in which criminal youth are at present dealt with," &c. "These resolutions were unanimously adopted by both houses and approved by the Governor. March 29th, 1864," whereupon the Governor at once appointed George T. Cobb, of Morris. Phineas B. Kennedy, of Warren, and Samuel Allinson, of Mercer, Commissioners.

The commissioners entered carnestly upo the work assigned them, and in its prosecution opened correspondence with various parts of every one whom they supposed likely to aid ton. them in their search for reliable information upon this subject. WASHINGTON, March 28th.-Officers wounded in the fight on Saturday, in front of Petersburg, say that the affair, though partaking of the nature of a general battle, was in reality nothing more than an extended skirmish, owing to the

dispirited condition and unwillingness of the Rebels to fight. They made unmistakable signs of surrender, and in the opinion of an officer who commanded a brigade in their front, could have been flanked and captured by half a regiment, but our flanking fire prevented them from coming in. They were arged on frantically by their officers, but to no purpose. They laid down on their

bellies, and refused to advance. In two volleys fired by them at our troops, only three men were slightly wounded. Laws of New Jersey.

Act to authorize the township of Maurice River, in the country of Cumberland, to raise money by taxation to liquidate liabilities for the payments of bounties to volun-

Whereas, the township of Maurice River, in the county of Cumberland, has incurred liabilities for the payment of bounties to vol unteers under the calls made therefor by the President of the United States during the year eighteen hundred and sixty-four, on the faith of said townshp, and requests that the action of the township in the premises may be sanctioned and legalized by this Legislature.

1. Be it enacted by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey, That any debt or liability incurred, under the auhority of the township committee or inhabitants of said township, and any bond, note or other security or evidence of indebtedness that has been given, or may hereafter be given, to secure the payment of liabilities incurred, or that may be incurred, for the payment of bounties to volunteers under said calls, and including liabilities for bounties to recruits in lieu of the draft ordered by the President of the United States, to be made on the fifteenth day of February, eighteen hundred and sixty-five, shall be as valid and effectual as if the consecurity, or the contracting of such debt or liability.

2. And be it enacted, That it shall be lawful to raise by assessment on the taxable property of said township, at the same time and in the same manner that other taxes are assessed and collected therein, and also by a poll tax of ten dollars upon each and every male citizens of said township, money to pay said debt or liabilities, redeemed and paid, and the collector of the said township shall have full power and authority to collect the sums so assessed, in the manuer now prescribed by the acts relative to the collection of taxes and shall be liable for eglect of duty, in respect to said tax, as he i by law for neglect of duty in respect to other taxes. 3. 
