Not only have Richmond and Petersburg been captured, but the enemy have lost in the battles, commencing on Wednesday last and concluding with Sunday night, not less than twenty-five thousand men in prisoners, and at least fifteen thousand in killed and wounded, while at the same time nearly two hundred pieces of artillery, immense quantities of stores, and small arms without number have fallen into our hands. All this, moreover, has been accomplished at a cost on our part of not more than seven thou sand in killed, wounded and captured-by far the greater number being but slightly wounded and but few, comparatively, killed. 
