TO WHAT ARE WE TENDING. The premeditated and heartless assassination of President Lincoln, independent of the crime itself, is a calamity fraught with many sad reflections, which irresistably intrude upon us. The foul deed affords evidence of the culmination of a morbid sentiment, which places a light estimate upon human life, while it manifests a growing demoralization in all that should command respect and obedience to the laws of the land. Among other evils inaugurated by the rebellion, that of personal revenge, and a reckless desire to inflict punishment, as passion or prejudice may direct, without regard to the restraints of law,-is mo t prominent. This feeling has gradually learned the community to endorse what has been heretofore condemded, viz:-the carrying of deadly weapons. This practice, so rigidly adhered to in the Southern States, had been in a great measure abandoued up to the period when our national troubles commenced. The war revived it, however, and seems to have rendered it more popular than ever .-Now, is it not an unfrequent occurrence, to meet men carrying dirks, bowie-knives, revolvers, billies, and other murderous weapons, who are considered prudent, cautious, and slow to anger. This is certainly a new phase of Northern morals and manners, and one which has already added much to the catalogue of crime within the last four years .-Personal renconnters, murderous assaults, and assassinations, have become more frequent in consequence; because the very possession of these instruments of death, will prompt resentment for slight causes, or lead men into dan-

by civilization and humanity. We know that most of the States have enacted laws against carrying concealed weapons; and perhaps the laws are all sufficient, were they enforced; but they have become a dead letter. Our civil war, giving birth to feuds, revenges, guerilla raids, &c., has raised the cry of self-defence, especially in our border States; and it is echoed throughout the North. where we are blessed with profound peace, and feel secure in the enjoyment of our social and political rights. While a necessity for such guards against ruffianism, robbery or murder, may have existed in the vicinity of border warfare, none exists here. The honest, upright, well-meaning citizen, can have no possible use for them; and the man who wears them, must estimate human depravity by the conscious wickedness of his own heart. Guilt alone can prompt suspicion against the peaceful and unoffending, for the innocent are ever

Let us hope, that the sad pageant of millions mourning over a murdered President, as his ounter were borne to their last resting place may serve to awaken a deep feeling of indignation against this cowardly practice. If we have laws affixing proper ponalties for such an offence, enforce them; if we have not, enact them. Assassination is a fearful crime under all circumstances; but when it strikes down the head of the nation-a husband and father. a Christian and citizen-who is safe? If, in the midst of this work of mercy-in the act of forgiving his own and his country's enemies -with both hands extended to welcome back the erring to affection and to duty-Abraham Lincoln was struck down by the assassin-it shows that provocation is not essential to the to the use of deadly weapons. It also shows that their very possession suggests the crime .-Our criminal annals proclaim, in unmistakable language, a growing recklessness of life. Murders are more frequent, assaults with deadly weapons are common, and too many are disposed to "take the law into their own hands." In short, we cannot close our eves to the progressive demoralization of society; and we naturally ask ourselves the question-"to what are we tending?" It will require the whole fore of moral power, embodied in public sentiment, to check this evil; and unless we set about it, this fair and happy land may one day rival Italy in assassinations, Corsica in the rendetti, and surpass the lawless bandits of the old World, in our defiance of law and order. Therefore, as Secretary Stanton urged upon every citizen to act as a detective in as we look over the history of Nations. search of Booth, so let every man who execrates the murderous wretch, arrest and bring to punishment the coward who wears concealed weapons. Such a creature only differs from Booth in this-the one committed the deed. the other only awaits an opportunity to commit it; hence, he deserves punishment for being prepared to do it.

It is made the duty of the clerk of the board to make out within thirty days after the annual meeting the board, or he will be punished by indictment for a misdemeanor, and fined the sun of fifty dollars. At the session of 1864 a law was passed directing township clerks to publish within sixty days after town meeting "a full and complete watch from \$5 to \$100; pianos \$1 account of the receipts and expenditures of the township committee during the preceding year, and to cause the same to be published," out no penalty for the non-performance of this duty being prescribed in the act the law was not generally complied with. The last legislature remedied this difficulty by a supplement which provides that in case the clerk neglects to perform this duty "he shall forfeit and pay he sum of fifty dollars-one-half to go to the township and one-half to the person who rings suit for the same"-said report to be ublished in all the newspapers printed in said county—as all the newspapers in each county are now required to publish the public laws of the State.

The legislature, by the passage of these acts have done the people of the State a service. and will save the tax-payers thousands of dollars from being squandered by the recklessness of many of the county and township officers who have heretofore not been compelled to make a clear showing of their affairs, and consequently could not be held to a strict acountability for their acts. Now the people vill know who it is that expends the public noneys, who make more out of their offices han they obght to, and who takes only such pay for services as justly belongs to him, or llows others to do so through his orders. Whatever faults the last legistature may have been charged with, these acts alone will in the aggregate do the people more real service than all the other acts passed by them can possibly do them injury

#### INCOME TAX. The amended form of returns for the income

tax have been received by the Assessors of In-ternal Revenue: The blank which every citizen is obliged to fill up covers all the ground, and unless a man perjures himself, there can be no escape. We give below the material points of the blank forms, which set forth a long array of questions requiring answers:

The detailed statements of the form are comprised under sixteen heads, covering all sources of income or profit for the year end-ing December 31, 1864. The following quesons are to be asked by the assessor:

Had your wife any income last year? Did any minor child of yours receive any salary last year? Have you included in this return the income

of your wife and salary received by minor children? Have you any stocks, and what are they? Is your report made on the basis of gold? Have you bought or sold stocks or other

roperty?
Have you any United States securities? Do you return the premium on gold paid ou as interest on United States securities? Have you kept any book account?

Is your income estimated or taken from you Have not the expenses, &c., claimed a deductions, already been taken out of the mount reported as profits? Did you estimate any portion of your profits

making your returns for 1863. Was any portion treated as worthless, and and if since paid, have you included it in this All incomes of 1864 less than five thousand

dollars are subject to five per cent. tax; over five thousand dollars, ten per cent. The blanks oust be filled and returned to the assessor by the first of May. Personal service of the blanks is necessary; the assessor's duty re requiring him only to make public announce ent in a newspaper of his county. Deductions are permitted as follows: 1. Exempt by law, \$600.

2. All national, State and local taxes paid within the year, (which includes the deducion of the income taxes actually paid in 1864. 3. Losses on sales of real estate purchase within the year. 4. Interest paid out or falling due within the 5. Amount actually paid for rent of home

stead, store or shop. 6. Insurances, repairs, fuel consumed in carrying on business, wages of employees, and interest on incumbrances.

silver plate 5 cents. The tables in the blank form are very elaborated ate, but the foregoing are the principal points. Every person failing to make returns b 15th of May, will be liable to be assessed y the assistant assessor according to the best iformation he can obtain; and in such case he assistan t assessor will add twenty-five per

cent, to the amount of tax.

In case any person shall deliver to an asses or any false or fraudulent list or statement. with intent to defeat or evade the valuation or enumeration required by law, the assistant asessor will add one hundred per cent. to such duty: and in such case the list will be made out by the assessor or assistant assessor, and from the valuation and enumeration so made there can be no appeal.

A Proclamation by the President. Whereas. Armed resistence to the authority this Government, in certain States heretoore declared to be in insurrection, may be regarded as virtually at an end, and the persons whom that resistance, as well as the operaions of insurgent cruisers were directed, and egitives or captives.


