We can scarcely regard the recently inaugurated scheme of emigration to Mexico in any more favorable light than an attempt to organize a regular fillibustering expedition similar in character and purpose to those attempted a few years ago by Walker to Nicaragua and Lopez to Cuba, and which may, possibly, result in similar consequences to the leaders.-All such expeditions, although assuming to be intended for peaceful individual interests, or the development of agricultural and other resources of the country, if they are unauthorized by law, of course. are improper; and, in case any member becomes involved in difficulty, he cannot expect to receive protection from the government. Outlawry is still the same, no matter what disguises or technical forms it may assume for the purpose of evading explicit rules of law and order.-Thousands of people affect honest purposes in order to carry out some scheme of villainy which cannot be seen, at first, on the surface, and which they hope will not be detected by any direct process of law. But, the animus prompting the commission is just as culpable, just as nefarious in character, and just as deserving of punishment as if no point of positive law had been evaded. In fact it partakes of a double crime. Section I. He it ordained by the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Bridgeton, in Council assembled, that it skall not be lawful for any Horses, Cattle, Swine, Sheep, Goats or Geese, to pe at large within the limits of the city; and all such found running at large may by any officer or citizen be taken to any poundkeeper in the City, who shall receive them and who shall receive from the owner for all Horses, Cattle and Swine \$1.25 per head, and for Sheep and Goats seventy-five cents per head and for Geese twenty-five cents each; of which fifty cents for sheep and goats, and thirteen cents for geese, shall belong to said poundkeeper, who shall pay over the balance of the above sum to the Treasurer of the City; and he shall receive the further sum for each day he may keep such animal or animals so impounded, to wit: For horses, twenty-five cents; cattle twenty-five cents, switch therefore cents, goats thirteen cents, geese five cents; and it shall be the duty of the poundkeeper to provide suitable tood for the animals. royided that nothing herein contained shall in any rise interfere with the driving of cattle to and from aforesaid that if any person or persons shall unlawfuli enter or by force, and violence break, open either of the pounds of the City and release any horses, cattle sheep, while or geese impounded in accordance with this ordinance, he she, or they so offending shall each and every one of them forfeit and pay the sum of twenty dollars for every such offence, to be recovered in an action of debt, with costs, in the name of the Treasurer of the said city, before any Justice of the Peace or the Mayor thereof, for the use of the incor-noration thereof. oration thereof.

An Ordinance, regulating the sale of Vinous, Spirituous or Fermented Liquors.
Szerios I. Be it ordained by the Mayor and Common Council in council assembled, that if any person or persons shall, without license for that purpose first had and obtained, sell, or cause, or knowingly permit to be sold, any wine, run, gin, brandy, whiskey, cider, spirits, or other ardent spirits, or any composition of which any of the said be ors shall form the chief ingredients, except such as shall be compounded and intended to be used as medicine, by less measure than one quart, or in any measure exceeding the same and under five gallons, within the corporate limits of the city of Bridgeton, shall forfeit and pay for every such offence the sum of tendollars with costs, to be recovered by action of debt before the Mayor or any Justice of the Peace of said city, in the name of the Treasurer, for the use of the city.

Section 2. That it shall not be lawful for any person or persons, within said limits, to sell or offer for sale, any porter, ale, beer, or cider, or any fermented liquors of any kind, without first obtaining a license for such sale, from the Mayor and Common Conneil of said city, and every person or persons offending against the provisions of this ordinance, shall forfeit and pay the sum of five dollars with costs for the first offence, and the further sum of ten dollars for each and every other offence, to be recovered as aforesaid, in the oame of the Tresturer of the city, for the use of said city. se of said city.
Section 3. That every person or persons licensed as

Section 3. That every person or persons licensed as aforesaid, to sell vinous, spritinous or ferminted liquors, shall at all times keep an orderly house or place of business; they shall not sell, or otherwise dispose of any such liquors so as to encourage drunkenness, reveling or trolicking; nor shall they sell to minors, nor upon the first day of the week, commonly called Sunday; and he, she or they oftending against the provisions of this ordinance, shall forfeit and pay for every such offence the sum of fifteen dollars, to be recovered as aforesaid, with costs, in an action of debt, in the name of the Treasurer of the city, for the use of said city; and upon their conviction the Mayor and Common Council shall have power to revoke their heense, provided, that nothing heren contained shall be so construed as to prevent or impair any prosecution by indictment under the laws of the State of New Jersey.






