There was never such a country as ours never such a war, never such warriors, never such victories. The achievements from which these soldiers now come home ensures domestic and foreign tranquility, "freedom, law, industry, education, peace, growth, influence wealth, and all else that is esteemed among men, for so long a time as fire burns or water runs. The revolution built the pile; this war rivets and pins it beyond the possibility of overthrow. The men who have done it in the field are the men now assembled at and about Washington. This deed was glorious. But glorious as it was and is, it will go down to futere ages enhanced in glory from the noble manner in which war is deserted when the victory is won. There is not a battle on all the roll of the past four four years that will shine so long or so gloriously as that won by the soldiery on the peaceful plain about Washing-

And when these war worn veterans again seek the peaceful shelter of their own homes and firesides, additional feelings of patriotism will well up in their own hearts and brighten the eyes of the dear ones there, as they relate the story of their efforts to put down the traitors against the flag and laws of their country. Ordinance No. 2. An Ordinance, regulating the sale of Vi-nous, Spirituous or Fermented Liquors. Section I. Be it ordained by the Mayor and Com-non Council in council assembled, that it any person r persons shall, without license for that purpose first or persons shall, without liceuse for that purpose its had and obtained, sell, or cause, or knowingly per mit to be sold, any wine, rum, gin, brandy, whiskey cider, spirits, or other ardent spirits, or any composition of which any of the said liquors shall form the ducf ingredients, except such as shall be compound ed and intended to be used as medicine, by less mea are than one quart, or in any measure exceed to same and under five gallons, within the co ate limits of the city of Bridgeton, shall forfeit and pay for every such offence the sum of ten dollars with costs, to be recovered by action of debt before the Mayor or any Justice of the Peace of said city, in the costs, to be recovered by action of debt before the Mayor or any Justice of the Peace of said city, in the name of the Treasurer, for the use of the city. Section 2, That it shall not be lawful for any person or persons, within said limits, to sell or offer for sade, any porter, ale, beer, or cider, or any fermented liquors or any kend, without first obtaining a license for such sale, from the Mayor and Common Council of said city, and every person or persons offending against the provisions of this ordinance, shall forfeit and pay the sum of live dollars with costs for the first offence, and the further sum of ten dollars for each and every other offence, to be recovered as afore-said, in the name of the Trersurer of the city, for the use of said city.

That every person or persons licensed as aforesaid, to sell vinous, spirituous or fermented liquors, shall at all times keep an orderly house or place of business; they shull not sell, or otherwise dispose of any such liquors so as to encourage drunkenness, reveiling or frolleking; nor shall they sell to minors, nor moon the flist day of the week, commonly called Sunday; and he, she or they offending against the provisions of this ordinance, shall forfeit and pay for every such offence the sam of fifteen dollars, to be recovered as aforesaid, with costs, in an action of delet, in the name of the Treasurer of the city, for the use of said city; and upon their conviction the Mayor and Common Council shall have power to revoke their leense, provided, that nothing hereau contained shall be so construed as to prevent

Be it ordained by the Mayor and Common Council of the city of Bridgeton, in commeit assembled, that if any person or persons shall wilfully or carelessly break, or cause to be breken, any public or private lamps, or any window or door, or any pane or panes of glass belonging to any window or door within the bounds of the city, or shall wilfully and malicinally mirraging shall or their tree stand door within the bounds of the city, or shall wilfully and maliciously injure any shale or other tree standing on the streets of said city, or deface or injure any fence, pavement, building, porch, post or pillar, belonging to any house within the limits of said city, or shall anywise injure or deface the same, except accidentally, every person or persons so oftending shall forfeit and pay for each offence a fine not less than one dollar or more than ten dollars; to be recovered with costs in an action of debt, in the name of the Treasurer of said city, before any Justice of the Peace or the Mayor chercot, for the use of said city, or shall be imprisoned in the county jail for any term not exceeding five days.




