#### ENGLISH SYMPATHY.

From the commencement of our civil war it has been the settled policy of England's aristocracy to oppose the efforts of this government, to put down the rebellion and bring back the people of the seceded States to a sence of submission to law and order. Our aristocratic neighbors on the other side of the Atlantic. could see no possibility of the North ever conquering the South in its mad attempts at establishing a separate Confederacy.-Every brilliant victory achieved by our arms over the rebels was converted into our defeat by their newspaper correspondents -the capture of rebel seaports and inland cities and towns amounted to nothing in their capacious eyes. In fact, there was nothing believed by them right for the loyal Northern people, and nothing wrong for those in rebellion. Their sympathies -their feelings-their "material aid and comfort" were in favor of the factious men who had taken up arms against rightful authority and law. Professing neutrality in its broadest sense, they secretly permitted private citizens to fit out and send upon the ocean their blockade-runners and iron-clad rams to destroy and prey upon United States commerce—they instructed their courts of judicature to allow felons belonging to Jeff. Davis' bastard Government to escape through techpossible obsticle in the way of a fair and honorable administration of justice. For these unfriendly exhibitions towards this country England's aristocracy will yet have their reward-the day of humilia tion is not far distant. Already the tone of their presses and public men indicate the alarm felt in England, and propositions have been made pointing to an alliance with France and Spain for self-protection against an anticipated attempt on our part to interfere with Canada or the French interest in Mexico. Such action indicates the natural dread entertained by propriating them to the uses and purposes of the English Government of the invincible prowess and constantly increasing strength of the United States. This fact is rendered all the more obvious by the recent surrendering of the rebel armies, and the Rio Grande to the St. Lawrence, and from precipitate flight of the leaders of the rebellion to escape merited punishment.— English statesmen see this; for by the last advices received from London, they virtually acknowledge the prowess of our armies, but with that hauteur and arrogance which give evidence still of their sympathy with the defunct power of the rebel authorities. Why the feelings and friendship of the British should have been thus exhibited against us is not difficult of solution. Twice in the history of this nation she has been made experimentally acquainted with Yankee pluck, ingeunity and strength, and on several other occa sions she had narrowly escaped sound and deserved chastizations at our hands.-These facts, taken in connection with the fear of losing her possession on this continent, inspired her aristocracy with a hope that our rebellion would completely sever the country, thus giving European governments greater power in the New World; and, in order to precipitate this "devoutly wished for consummation," all the aid outside of actual hostilities she could render was freely given and allowed to the insurgents. Even while our own not fail to inspire all other powers and nations vessels were crossing the Atlantic with food and clothing for her own starving people, the curses of aristocratic nabobs and Shylocks in Europe were hurled against us as a nation and a government. The eyes of England will, one of these days, be opened to a sense of the wrong she has imposed upon us—but that day

### may come too late for her good.

#### THE END OF HOSTILITIES.

For more than four years past, our country has been convulsed with fends and bitter war. the industrial interests of the land were paralyzed by the acts of rebellion, and commerce vielded to the demands of the hour. The people who for half a century were engaged in peaceful avocations, who were found in the work shops, the fields, the manufactories, and every other branch of civil industry, have been employed in defending the flag and government of the United States; and the consequences are, all business operations have received a check which amounts to a panic .-But the trials and battles in the field are about ending. The deluded men who precipitated the revolt, and who led their followers into the whirlpool of war, have yielded to the superiority of the Union armies and resources, laid down their arms and become prisoners of war. Those States, which, in the beginning, set out with such a defiant attitude, trampling upon the flag and laws that had protected them for so many years, have welcomed back the stars and stripes of that same flag, and are now organizing again on true democratic and republican principles. Right glad were the rebel soldiers when the order came for them to stack their arms, and prepare to go to their homes. They had long looked for that glorious day, they had suffered, hungered and bled, they did not wish to fight, in many instances. against the national government, but did so out of compulsion, and were filled with joy when they became released. Our own brave men too are marching home. They have left many of their companions buried in the valleys and among the mountains of the South, they have seen others of them come home with the loss of an arm, or a leg, or of health. But nical intervention -- thus interposing every these will rejoice with as much enthusiasm, as much exultation, as those who are now returning, in the work of restoring the Union to its former greatness and grandeur.

#### LESSONS OF THE HOUR.

To the careful student of American history the present hour is fraught with more than or dinary magnitude and importance. Within the last century no nation has furnished, in the space of four years, so much material for history, or developed so powerful a military arm as the United States of America. The arts and sciences, the avocations of peaceful industry, all have conspired to call into exercise the resources of our country, and of apwar. These circumstances constitute a lesson by which we, as well as all foreign governments, may profit. #### INCOME TAX.

TREASURY DEPARTMENT,

OFFICE OF INTERNAL REVENUE, WASHINGTON, D. C. Complaints continue to be received at this office that many persons liable to income tax fail to make full returns. Those complaints

have become so general that I deem it a duty I owe to the public service to call the attentio of assessors to the subject, that they may exert the nedessary diligence to remove, if pos sible, the cause, Any tax-payer who renders untrue returns commits a triple offence: first, against the

country which he defrauds; secondly, against his neighbor, whom he injures by casting upon him a larger share of the public burden than he ought to the ar, and thirdly, against the law which is violated both civilly and criminally not probably visit Bridgeton again for a long and which demands for the act a doubling c the debt as a recompense, and punishment for the crime as a retribution.

Erroneous returns are due sometimes to ig norance, sometimes to carelessness and inad vertence, and sometimes, also, to a deliberate purpose to defraud the Government. When their correctness is supected, assistant asses sors ought not to hesitate to make the neces sary inquiries, in order to ascertain the truth Otherwise this duty is not performed. Delicacy under such circumstances must b laid aside, and respect for wealth, influence or social position must yield to the higher of ligations of official responsibility. Honest men when properly interrogated will not in general refuse to afford satisfaction to Government officers, and the dishonest should not be suffered

nice to endure a disreputable imputation without offence. A cheerful submission to a proceeding which a due execution of the law re quires, is demanded in times like these equally by patriotism and good sense, and an appeal to those possessed of such qualities will seldom fail to produce the desired response. If any errors are believed to exist, it is not ne cessary to assume, in the first place, that they have been committed wilfully; but, on the contrary, it may be well to advise the tax-payer to amend his return, and to accept it avails himself of the opportunity. If he refuses to do so, section 14th of the late act authorizes a mode of proceeding which, if vigor ously pursued, will eviscerate the truth. Tax-payers who are not cognizant of their esponsibilities ought to be informed of them

and those who are unable to make out their returns, ought to be kindly instructed and as sisted by the assistant assessors; but wilful and incorrigible offenders should be made to recognize the power of the law in the promp and sure visitation of its penalties. Let assistant assessors understand that it is their business not merely to take returns, but to as certain whether they are correct, and when they have reason to believe the mincorrect, to act as already indicated. When an increased assessment is sworn down untruly, the case should be reported to the assessor, who should, when probable cause appears, institute an investigation, and make it searching and thor-

A false return, even though accepted with out alteration and the tax paid, has no binding effect on the Government. When the fraud is discovered, the assistant assessor may make the proper increase, and if the tax-payer shall swear down the assessment on the increased harm. Official announcement that the war is return, he may be proceeded against for the perjury; or, which is the better way, instead of the increase being made, an investigation may be had under section 14, the just amount of the duty ascertained, and twenty-five per cent added to it by way of penalty. An ordinance to Prevent the Writing of Obscene Words, the Mutilating and Destroying of Advertisements and Ord nances of this City, and to Prevent the Commission of Nuisances

Section 1. Be it ordained by the Mayor and Common Council of the city of Bridgeton, in council assembled, That if any person shall write or cause to be written any obscene word or words, or shall draw or cause to be drawn any immodest or offensive figure upon any house, wall, or fence, or other place in the City of Bridgeton, the person or persons so offending City of Bridgeton, the person or persons so offending shall forfest and pay a penalty of five collars for eac and every offence, to be recovered in an action of debt, in the name of the Treasurer, before the May or a Justice of the Peace, for the use of the city, or ir prisonment not exceeding five days. Section 2. And be it ordained by the authority afore ments, or any of the ordinances of this City, suc person or persons so offending shall forfeit and pay fine of two dollars for each and every offence, to I recovered in an action of debt, in the name of the Tre surer, before the Mayor or a Justice of the Peace, to the use of the city, or be imprisoned in the jail for any time not exceeding five days.

And be trordained by the authority aforesaid, That if any person shall violate decency by the improper exposure of the person, or by the commission of missances on the streets, footways or public places of the said city, the person so offending shall forfeit and pay a fine of five dollars for each and every offence, to be recovered in an action of glob, before the Mayor or a Justice of the Peace, in the name of the City Treasurer, for the use of the City, or shall be liable to imprisonment in the county jail for any time not exceeding five days. not exceeding five days.

The larger part of half a century has elapsed since the admirable map of New Jersey, by Thomas F. Gordon, was published. Excellent as it was at the time, the great prosperity and increase of the State have demanded a New Map. So greatly was fine need felt that, by an act of the Legislature, passed March 2d, 1854, a Topographical and Geological survey was or dered. It was commenced and continued for some years, until the excess of expense beyond the estimates discouraged the Legislature, and it was suspended. The late lamented 1r. William Kitchell, who was at the head of the Geological department, did not like to see the result of his years of labor lost to the State, and, obtaining an act for the purpose, he engaged the aid of private capital and enterprise for the preparation and issue of the present spiendid State map, to the perfection of which he devoted the latter part of his life. He just lived to see it completed and left the returns to be derived from it as a legacy to his family.

An Act relative to the Geoligical Survey Of this State.

WHEREAS, The Agricultural Society believe it to be ecossary for the agricultural and other interests of the State, that the topographical and geological survey, commenced by authority of this State, and nov suspended in con-equence of the great expense at tending its prosecution; and whereas, at this time through the efforts of the State Agricultural Society it has been ascertained that an arrangement can be made by the State with Dr. Wm Kitchell to prosecute the completion of this important work without any further expense to the Stite; therefore, Be it enacted, &c., That Wm. Kitchell be and is hereby authorized to complete the geological survey of this State,—said survey being made according to the plan prescribed by an act entitled, "An Act to cause a Geological survey," approved the second day of March, eighteen hundred and fifty-four; and that of March, eighteen hundred and fifty-four; and that for the purpose of completing said survey, said Kitchell shall have the use of the wood-cuts, field-maps, apparatus, and other materials appertaining to and heretefore used in said survey, said articles to remain the property of the State, and to be returned to the State Treasurer after said work is completed; provided, that said geological survey shall be made and completed, and the maps and reports of said survey shall be made and published by said Kitchell, at his own cost, without any charge or expense to the State.

And be it enacted, That after said survey is completed, said Kitchell shall, without charge therefor, celiver to the Governor ren copies of the map and report thereof for the use of the State library and State officers, and one copy for the use of the State Agricultural Society; and shall also deposit in the clerk's office of each county in the State one copy to be kept for the free use and benefit of the people of said counties; the report of said survey of all the counties to be published in one book, and the survey of the whole state to be shown on one map, which shall be on a scale not smaller than three miles to the inch.

And be it enacted, That this act shall be a public act, and take effect immediately.


