THE DUTIES OF THE HOUR. The termination of the war begins to disclose unmistakable evidences of social difficulties. which are always incident to prolonged wars. The world will never know the privation and suffering our fathers endured at the close of the Revolutionary struggle. Continental money was worthless, provisions were so scarce as to threaten a famine, the soldiers were discharged without pay, and the people feared that not a few of them, urged by their necessities, would, form maranding bands, and se our then imperfect laws at defiance. Nothing but the purest devotion to country, and a burn ing desire for liberty, which they had learned and imbibed in the severest school of patriotism, could have restrained the destitute populace from acts of violence, and perhaps oper anarchy, which might have rendered that memorable conflict of seven years, a curse instead of a blessing. In fact, the historian has failed to record the social difficulties encountered by our ancestors, during the incipient formation of a government, which was considered but an experiment by some of the wisest men of the age.

Were we to trace out every trial and vexation that drew upon the patience of the people at that period, how little cause for dissatisfaction would exist, by comparing the present with the past. With our granaries well stored, agriculture prosperous, and all mechanical and manufacturing business subject to but a temporary check, our grievances are too insignifie: at to be named. Every Northern State has enjoyed uninterrupted peace, save the border troubles in Pennsylvania. While supplying all the wants of government to carry on the war, we have had a surplus to export. In fact, the great majority of the people have escaped all inconvenience; and, but for the increased prices caused by our National troubles, by which many profitted, few would have realized the fact that a war of unprecedented magnitude was in progress. Enjoying so many blessings, and suffering so little, while environed by so great an evil, we should not only feel grateful, but express our gratitude, by cheerfully shouldering the burdens which so happy a termination of the war has entailed upon us. Were they of a permanent character, there might be some cause of complaint; but, in view of our immense resources, they can only prove transitory vexations at best.

The duties of the hour, therefore, must be apparent to every christian-to ewry philanthropist—to every man of human instincts.— If ever a liberal spirit was necessary to effect a good purpose, its exercise is needed now. One million of men at least, including the soldiers in the field, and those employed in various ways to carry on the war such as civilians, operatives, artizans, &c., must soon be thrown loose upon the country-all of whom will be compelled to seek new employment, and procure the comforts of life through other channels of industry. It is impossible that the necessary avenues of labor sufficient to supply this immense demand, can open up spontaneously. The change must necessary be gradual, and it may be some years before society recovers its former equilibrium-nor is the immense emigration from Europe, calculated to hasten so desirable an event, while we lack the means of giving employment to a disbanded army. Such is now our present unenviable position; and knowing that the business men and capitalists of the country can do more than any other class toward alleviating the threatened distrss-we call upon them to use their means to that end, by extending their business, by the projection of every safe enterprise that pudence may suggest, and by making such improvements, as will create a demand for labor. Do not keep your money locked up, but put it out where it will be productive of rather than see men who have fought the hattles of the country languishing for the necessaries of life. Give men work who are willing to work: for it is a sad spectacle to witness a man begging for the privilege to toil. Again. The duties of the hour speak the

condemnation of any man or set of men, who would take advantage of an excess of workmen to reduce the wages of mechanics and working-men. Remember, that excess is mainly caused by our returning veterans; and after fighting for employers who staid at home, and made money on the war-it would be a poor reward to these brave fellows, should they be made the instruments of striking down the wages of a trade at which they must make a living. This would be the refinement of cruelty. Rents are as high, food, clothing, fuel, &e., with but triffing exceptions, are just as costly, although the difference between paper money and gold, is only about thirty cents.-Thus, against the prediction of the wisest po litical economists, the necessaries of life are stationary, at exhorbitant prices although the to an equality every day. Assessment and Collection of Taxes. The laws respecting taxes being of a comolicated nature, and not very easy to underaccurate in every particular, we think will be found in the main to be correct:

The assessors of each ward are to ascertain the value of property to be assessed, between the twentieth day of June and the twentieth day of August, and return their duplicates to the collectors, not later than September twentieth. The board of assessors meet September fourth. The duplicate cannot be comvalue is made; and the assessor must be careeach individual, for State, county, ward, military, school, road, poll, dog and lamp purposes; for unless this is done, it may be doubtful whether the taxes can be collected. (See Act, approved April 14, 1864.)

Each single white male inhabitant is to be taxed a poli tax of two dollars, and each married one, a dollar, besides the poll tax authoward in which the same shall lie.

The list of debts claimed to be deducted, must be sworn to .-Real estate should be examined and valued by the assessor himself.

To secure uniformity, the taxation should be according to the value and amount, on the twentieth day of June.

the third Monday of Oct er, which is the day for hearing appeals, demand the tax of all persons to be found in the ward, or by leaving it at his residence, by a written or printed notice, setting forth the respective valuations of the real and personal estate of the individual taxed; the sum required by law to be raised on each hundred dollars' worth of property taxation; and the respective sums assessed on said individual for State, county, ward, military, poor, school, road, poll, dog, and other taxes, each tax being designated in a line by itself, and at the end of said line the amount of the tax being set down in figures; and he

ought also to state the place and day of appeal. Taxes must be paid to the collector by the Monday next preceding the first Tuesday of good, and be content with moderate profits, November, (the 8th), and if not so paid, the collector returns the delinquent to the Mayor, or a resident Justice of the Peace, who is to administer an oath to the collector, that the moneys on said list have been duly demanded, and said Mayor or Justice, within five days, delivers a warrant or warrants to one or more at the rate of twelve per cent. per annum, and

costs. Taxes are a lien on real estate, which may be sold to pay them; but to authorize this the assessor must designate the land on his duplicate by some short description that will be sufficient to ascertain the location and extent

The law is very strict in requiring a written statement of the taxes, with all the particulars above noticed, to be delivered to every tax payer who resides, or can be found in the ward; so that if this omitted, no warrant can legally issue.




