TRIAL OF JEFF. DAVIS. It may be well for the authorities at Washington to give this arch-traitor a trial by the civil laws of the land in order to satisfy some technical points of legal procedure, but that can be all. He stands to-day before the nation as having forfeited his life by his own acts of high-handed treason, a self-condemned traitor. As such, he is even undeserving of sympathy, of respect and mercy. By his own choice and acts he set himself against the rightful authorities of the nation, and defied its powers. He lifted the bloody sword of rebellion; constituted himself the imperial leader of a dangerous revolt; and by this conduct he has caused the indiscriminate murder of thousands of more precious lives than his own, and the loss of millions of dollars' worth of property. With a wild frenzy, that prompted him on in his mad career, he overleaped the bounds of ordinary traitors, and plunged an entire nation into war-a war of the most wicked and gigantic character. But the indictment against him, found by the Grand Jury of the District of Columbia, is sufficiently explicit in enumerating the items of his guilt. We need no other evidence of his crimes than the wide-spread misery he has inflicted on the country. Every soldier's grave on the battlefields of the South; every limping, armless, sick,, wounded, pale, emaciated veteran, that meets our view; every widow, orphan, child, adopted :and vacant seat, rise up as irrefutable accusers and witnesses against him. Why is it, then, necessary to bother the courts of law with him! Has he not already been arrested, charged with murder, incendiarism and treason, and convicted by a competent jury? Not only this, but the people themselves have tried and condemned him. All that is, therefore, necessary to be done in his case, is, to take him from his confinement to the proper place provided for the occasion, put a sure noose about his neck, and elevate him to the position for-that of an arch-felon. The simple execution of Jefferson Davis is all that remains to be done to mete out justice to the insulted dignity of the nation and its majestic powers. The sooner this is done the better, and the sooner will the heart of the nation be satisfied that the authorities at Washington are determined that no technical quibble shall permitta traitor to escape. The law in such cases is plain and simple-treason in all its forms is defined in the most lucid manner, and every intelligent man, at all conversant with legal points, is satisfied that Jefferson Davis has transcended all the constitutional and statutory definitions of that crime. Yes: Jefferson Davis is well convinced of this himself. No man knows better than he what the laws relative to treason are; and knowing, he arrayed hin self against them. The attempt of Napoleon to establish monarchy in Mexico bids fair to prove a failure. Maximilian himself is doubtful of the position assigned to him in that unhappy country, and the last advices from Europe aunounce that the event of his resignation has already taken place. The difficulties he met with in organizing his authority in Mexico have been much greater than he anticipated, and at last he has found that even the Mexicans themselves, turbulent and revolutionary as they are, are unwilling to submit to the rule of a foreign dictator on their own soil. The signed to be cursed by a monarchial form of government, for it has evidently been preserved by Providence to elucidate the principles of free and republican institutions. Louis Napoleon, however, like all grasping and ambitious men in power in the Old World, attempted to take advantage of our domestic troubles to establish a Power in Mexico, and thus gain a foothold for himself which, under any other circumstances, he would not have been permitted to undertake. The application of the Monroe doctrine, which, heretofore, has been duly recognized on all hands, would have effectually barred his aspirations in this respeet. The close of the war, and the project of colonizing a portion of Mexico by American adventurers, will give new incentives for Maximilian to abdicate and retire from the throne which has been given him, but which, under the best circumstances, could have only been but temporary. It is too late for monarchs to seek power on this continent.

An Act relative to the Geoligical Survey of this State.

Whereas, The Agricultural society believe it to be necessary for the agricultural and other interests of the State, that the topographical and geological survey, commenced by authority of this State, and now suspended in sensequence of the great expense attending its proposed the State Agricultural Society, it has been ascertain. That an arrangement can be made by the State wan Dr. Win Kitchell to prosecute the completion of this important work without any further expense to the Stite: therefore,

Be it enacted, &c., That Win. Ritchell be and is hereby authorized to complete the geological survey of this State—said survey being made according to the plan prescribed by an act entitled, "An Act to cause a Geological survey," approved the second day of March, eighteen hundred and fifty-four; and that for the purpose of completing said survey, said Kitchell shall have the use of the wood-cuts, field-maps, apparatus, and other materials appertaining to and heretefore used in said survey, said articles to remain the property of the State, and to be returned to the State Trasurer after said work is completed; provided, that sail geological survey shall be made and and completed, and the maps and reports of said survey shall be made and published by said Kitchell, at his own cost, without any charge or expense to the State.

And be it enacted, That after said survey is com-

his own cost, without any charge or expense to the State.

And be it enacted, That after said survey is completed, said Kitchell shall, without charge therefor, deliver to the Governor ten copies of the map and report thereof for the use of the State library and State officers, and one copy for the use of the State Agricultural Society; and shall also deposit in the clerk's office of each county in the State one copy to be kept for the free use and benefit of the people of said counties; the report of said survey of all the counties to be published in one book, and the survey of the whole State to be shown on one map, which shall be on a scale not smaller than three miles to the inch.

And be it enacted, That this act shall be a public act, and take effect immediately.

Approved March 15, 1860.




