> How Bodies are Embalmed .-- By embalming people generally are apt to imagine that the modern process consists of saturating, filling and surrounding the dead body with spices, gums and other indestructable and preservative substances, as is understood to have been the process practiced by the ancients. Such, however, is not the case. The modern process is about as follows: The blood is drawn off through the juglar vein. An incision is then made upon the inside of the thigh, through which a chemical liquid is injected by mechanical means.— This liquid permeates all the veins and arteries, taking the place before occupied by the blood, and in a short time renders the entire body as hard as stone, and as rigid as a statue. Gloucester Co. Teachers' Institute. The annual meeting of this Institute was held at Fislerville last week, opening its first session on Monday afternoon, with prayer, by Rev. E. Green of that village. Wm. Milligan, principal of public school of Woodbury, was appointed Secretary. Rev. E. Green, Dr. S. Fisler and Wm. Iszard were appointed a committee of reception. Jacob Iszard was appointed a committee on music. The time for opening the sessions was decided upon.

Iszards. In the afternoon Prof. Apgar gave an exercise on Map Drawing. "How many pupils can a teacher successfully instruct?" was discussed by Messrs. McAlister and Mulligan. In the evening, Prof. Apgar gave a very able and interesting lecture, entitled "The laws governing the distribution of the vegetable kingdom," after which Prof. Peckham gave one of his grand and characperistic lectures on "The circumstances that render a school pleasant."

On Wednesday morning, Wm. Iszard and Mr. McAllister gave exercises on long division and fractions. Prof. Peckham spoke at some length on the necessity of teachers preparing themselves on their studies before hearing recitations, he also gave an exercise on colors. with some of the children of the place. Wednesday afternoon, an exercise was given on mental arithmetic, after which Prof. Peckham interested the institute with an historical and geographical account of Mason and Dixon's fine. The Professor gave an exercise in object teaching, in which he clearly and forcibly proved its utility, interesting and instructing a large class of children, all of whom were delighted, and promised to attend the next day, and take another lesson. Prof. Peckham is not only one of the oldest and most thoroughly educated men in the State, but he is blessed with that happy faculty of imparting instruction to all classes, which renders him so

On Wednesday evening a lecture was delivered by Prof. E. G. Dalton, of Philadelphia, red. Next week we expect to give the upon "The nervous system," which was listened to with marked attention.

On Thursday, Prof. Dalton devoted himsel during the day to instructions in Physiology and Reading-treating not only of the general principles of Physiological Science, but giving health of pupils, and for encouraging the voice in speaking and reading in accordance with Physiological principles. In the practical drills in reading, the teachers joined.

A resolution, highly complimentary to the conductor called out a few appropriate and humorous remarks from Prof. Peckham. The audience then united in singing the Doxology, and the Institute adjourned.

The sessions of the institute were enlivened by vocal and instrumental music, by Prof. Paste and members of the institute. The attendance of teachers was not so large as it should have been.






