PEACH SYRUP MADE FROM PARINGS AND STONES. - Having canned half a peck of peaches, I took the stones and the parings, covered them with water, and boiled them until the juice could be thoroughly pressed out through a jelly-bag. #### INDEPENDENCE and NEUTRALITY

There are people to whom a dictionary is one of the most useless books imaginable. When once they have attached meanings to a word, no matter how contradictory they may be, a whole brigade of Websters would not suffice to alter them. If they have taken it into their heads that independence in a man who will not be bound by their party rules, means subserviency, while in themselves it means "a principle that enables a man to be truly manly," all argument is lost i attempting to convince them, to the contrary. If you are not of their creed t .ey will define your independence as "a cloak for some ignoble design," that in you it is "a clog upon the wheels of progress," a "seeking of fat offices," a "plotting of treason," a "teaching of infidelity," a being "hail fellow, well met, with the quintessence of wrong," that your independence does not allow of liberty to "say a hard word against any body," that it is "laboring to defeat constitutional liberty" that you are the "Booths who assassinated the President," that you "sell your birthright for a mess of pottage," and finally that "independent conservative unionism is simply a desire to obtain copperhead patronage," specially in the matter of "shoemaking."

While it is impossible to convince a party man to the contrary of this, simply because he is pledged not to be convinced, we are still not without hope that our readers will see it differently. We do not think that it requires any special greatness of mind to be something more than a mere party hack, nor do we believe that more than ordinary comprehensiveness of intellect is essential in order to decline following, blindfold, the leadings of any party. As we understand it, a numbers of men, possessing similar sentiments, into one body, for the purpose of advancing those sentiments into the position of laws. Besides his, when a party is firmly consolidated, its chief end has generally been to enable its aspirants to use its neck as a stepping stone to position and wealth, and the independent man respectfully declines the u c of his neck for any such purpose, while the party man is expected to be thankful for the privilege.

As the planks in most of the platforms possess the principle of contrariety, the independent man will generally find somedemn, while the bound adherent of a party dares not be either generous or just. It may be said that such a course of independence would have the effect of disintegrating the parties and destroying their organization. We admit this and add that this is just what we would desire. No party ever yet remained long together without an amount of corruption that neutralized its usefulness, and all attempts to reform them from within themselves have proved absolute failures.-We should not regret it if a hundred classes of sentiments, representing all shades of political opinions-incorporating and rejecting parts of each other, were in the field together, believing as we do, that the good sense of the people when untrammelled by the fetters of a great party, would generally choose the best, as the developing needs of the country demanded their adoption. The tendency of blind adherence to a party, as at present constituted, cannot be otherwise than demoralizing. The sentiments it advocates are continually changing, and its devotees accustom themselves to an open approval of everything it promulges simply because it does promulge them. Even if their private judgment should condemn them, so thorough is this demoralization, that it is no uncommon thing to see men, who have been the paid advocates of one party, supporting as strongly the opposition, when the bread was more nicely buttered there, and that too, without the trouble of passing through any change in their real sentiments. 


