#### SOME ARTS OF BEAUTY.

"Beauty is ever the divine thing the ancients painted it," and though it may sometimes prove a fatal legacy to an ill-trained, weak-minded girl, yet it is often a blessing than otherwise, and mothers ought to strive by all proper means to make their daughters beautiful and engaging, as well as virtuous and truthful.

#### PERSONAL APPLICATION.—Reader,

how are you living? If you are, you are growing into a strong, robust vigorous man? Are you taking such many exercises as will develop bone, muscle, and breathing power? Or are you sapping the foundations, wasting your vitality and fitting yourself for the almshouse or a premature grave. The processes of recreation are going on, and you are changing from a weak, nervous, and feeble man, to a strong, healthy, and vigorous man.

#### AMERICAN EXTRAVAGANCE IN LIVING.

To one who has traveled abroad, or informed himself thoroughly respecting the economy of domestic life in England, and on the continent, few things are more striking than our American extravagance. We waste in our food much which would be turned to good account in their family maintenance. Much goes into the soil, and is thrown out for the chickens and dogs, and cats, which would there be worked over for the table of the servants, or given to the poor. We are extravagant in dress. Broadcloth and silk, and patent leather and Alexander's gloves are none too fine for daily use. We are "clothed in purple and fine linen, and we fare sumptuously every day."

#### PEACH STRUP MADE FROM PARINGS AND STONES.

Having canned half a peck of peaches, I took the stones and the parings, covered them with water, and boiled them until the juice could be thoroughly pressed out through a jelly-bag. To each pint of this juice I added a pound of white sugar, and boiled the mixture down to thick syrup. The result is a beautiful clear syrup, of rich taste, a quart in quantity, at the cost of sugar only: for the skins and stones would otherwise have been thrown away as useless. Housekeepers who reluctantly purchase peaches because of their great cost, can use them more economically by making such use of what would else go to waste. I presume that a brown sugar, well clarified, would make a cheaper article, and but little inferior in looks and flavor.

#### HOW TO CURE A FELON.—The Petersburg, Va. #### RE-CREATION.

Change of change, eternal change, is the Divine order of Nature. We have daily light and darkness, spring and winter, winter; time for work and time for repose; but there is no standing still. Action is life—inaction is death. The planets continue in perpetual motion, and the human heart beats time to our breathing. From birth till death there is no cessation of stopping. We are undergoing a constant change, for better or for worse, in ever being re-created. Once in every seven years—some physiologists say six—the human body undergoes a complete change. All the material there is of us to-day will have passed off, and a new body taken on—re-created—in the course of seven years or less.

#### RE-CREATION.

Looked at from present standpoints, the processes of life and of change seem very slow; but when we look back, we realize more fully how "rapidly time flies," and how short is our stay here on earth. The poet thus expresses it:  
"A point of time, a moment's space,  
Removes me up to heavenly places,  
Or shuts me up in hell."

#### RE-CREATION.

But the question for us to consider is this: Are we when being re-made—improving? Or are we retrograding? We are ascending or descending—getting stronger or weaker. Have we attained the stature of men, are we now in right relations with the laws of matter and of mind? Or are we running counter to them? If living right, if conforming strictly to His requirements, we shall continue to improve from youth to age, from day to day, and from hour to hour. We disregard the laws which were established for our guidance and our good, if we run counter to them, the consequences will be fatal to us and to our posterity. "The wicked shall not live out half their days."

#### RE-CREATION.

Conditions.—In being re-created, we must remember that the human body, like the plant and the tree, grows on what feeds it. Good food, with good air and water, makes good blood; as good fertilizers make good soil, through which the plant and the tree have a more rapid and perfect growth; while bad, insufficient, or unwholesome food, impure air, and bad drink tend to degrade the blood, and lower the tone and quality of body and brain. In the same way that a poor, impoverished soil produces only dwarfed, or stunted plants, and weeds or brambles instead of trees and vines with delicious shade and fruits.

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#### HINTS FOR THE YOUNG FOLKS.

I shall use no baby talk in my lecture—you attend school where you are taught the meaning and the use of words, and I have no doubt you are also taught to think. The children of this age have a better education than their parents had so early in life, and you would laugh at me were I to employ the language of the nursery, or tell trundle bed stories merely. I will ask you a few questions and answer them myself; should I fail to give correct answers, I will hear your criticisms. Would you rather be very handsome, very rich, very wise, or very good? Some of you are handsome—some are rich—some are in a fair way to become wise—all can be good. In this lecture I propose to show you, in a few plain words, how you can all be handsome, very rich, very wise, or very good. I may take up the other points in future lectures. You are all more or less interested in this question. You would like to be handsome. It is no sin to be beautiful; it is no sin to wish to be beautiful. The flowers, the sweet children of the sun, are beautiful, so are the trees, and the clouds, and the stars. Now how can John and Mary, and Willie and Susan become beautiful? I shall do this negatively, first positively. You cannot make yourself handsome by merely wearing fine clothes. It is not true that fine feathers make fine birds. Paint, powder, perfume, oils, never add to the natural beauty of any person. No boy can make himself handsome by the use of tobacco. A cigar is no ornament. He who smokes will never be handsome. There is a little fellow with a long nose in my mouth, a little great end of the cigar and a little fool at the other. Chewing tobacco is just as bad, and I think worse, for it is filthy.
