### The Probable Course of the Ensuing Congress.

In a very brief period of time from this, the Congress of the American people, freed from the turmoil of war and the perplexities attendant upon its successful prosecution, will again assemble. Questions of the gravest importance, even in their present aspect, and of far graver importance still in the manner in which they will affect our future, will, of necessity, come before it for decision, for they are questions which cannot be evaded or delayed. President Johnson has realized their weight, and as far as has been possible, has left them all for Congress to determine, openly avowing as a good and wise man should, that he will be governed in his own course by their decisions; and thus upon them is thrown the burden of the retrogression or advancement of those national ideas of Liberty and Union for which we have sacrificed so much treasure and so much blood.

The first question which will meet them, and upon which so much of the rest will depend, will be the admission of the Congressmen from the States lately in rebellion. At first sight it would seem that, as they were empowered by the President to elect Congressmen, there could be no difficulty here; buf it must be remembered that this permission was granted to them upon the supposition that they accepted the laws and spirit of the Union as a basis for their guidance, and the President expressly informed them to this effect. He was magnanimous-he left them largely to themselves -but this broad principle was plainly placed before them. So far as the spirit of the Union is concerned, the Southern people have, in this question, ignored it altogether. Not one man who has been a friend to the Union during the war has been elected by them to Congress .-Scarcely a man who was even conservative has been so elected.
