The Central Railroad Disaster. Details of the affair -- Seven persons kill-

Among the many railway disasters which have lately occurred, few have been more frighton Friday morning of last week, about two miles west of the White House Station, on the New Jersey Central Railroad, where an express train coming east ran into a coal train bound advertisement in another column. in the same direction, seven persons being killed outright, and seventeen others more or less injured. The circumstances of the sad affair appear to have been about as follows: Between White House and Lebanon, which

is the next station westerly, there are two inclined grades, meeting almost at an angle about midway between the stations, which are fou miles apart. The grade next to the White House twenty feet to the mile, and the other, inclining from Lebanon, about forty-five feet The coal train, consisting of fifty-seven coal cars, descended the latter grade at a speed of eight miles an hour towards White House, but in doing so, the conductor noticed that a hay Lebanon, and was running down the incline with fearful velocity on the opposite (northern) track. Knowing that the express train from New York, bound west, which runs on the northern track, was then due, and that if the runaway car were not stopped, a collision must result, the conductor leaped from his own train, threw a cross tie on the rails before the fugitive and succeeded in checking its speed to some extent. He then swung himself on the car, applied the brake, and brought it to a halt just in time to prevent a collision with the express, which was then approaching. The engineer of the coal train in the meantime had gone on to flag the express, and succeeded in

topping it also in time. Meanwhile, half an hour had passed, and and conductor at once ran back to signal the express: but they had gone only a short distance when it came thundering round a curve and down the incline at a speed of over twenty miles an hour. The curve being a sharp one, and the view of the track shead somewhat obscured by trees, the engineer of the express was not able to see a distance of over one hundred yards ahead, but upon discovering the danger, at once whistled down the breaks and ately responded to, but it was too late—the engine dashed into the rear of the coal train. The engineer stood firmly at his post, while the fireman and a telegraph repairer, were crouch-ing under him in the "cab." 
