It is undeniable that competition in horses should be a prominent feature in our agricultural fair, but that such competition should take the form of simple trials of speed for enormous amounts of money, we emphatically deny. The horse that wins a large stake by trotting a mile a few seconds quicker than another, rarely earns a cent in any other way, the farmer's plow will make no deeper furrow because his colt is trained for triumph on the race course. There is no reason why the premium for trotting should be so out of proportion as to overshadow and render insignificant the premium for fat swine or draught oxen. No one who is familiar with our autumn fairs will deny the present existence of a disparity between the encouragement offered to racing, and that given to other more purely agricultural interests. It is the constant tendency to widen this disparity that there lies a danger, which threatens to impair and eventually destroy the usefulness of themselves. 


