Every day there are sales of wheat at the board which are real They consist of the actual exchange of so much wheat for so much money, the wheat being delivered by one party and the money lady dreaming of no wrong, suspecting no by the other. But for every such sale there are ten other sales in which no wheat passes and none is intended to be passed, and in which all the money involved is a margin on either side sufficient to cover any ordinary rise or fall in the market .-If the rise or fall be sudden and a little beyond the ordinary changes, the probability is that the party's margin is swallowed up, and he is regarded as baving failed. He borrows two or three hundred dollars to be employed again as a margin, and plunges in once more; if he makes any money, he settles his previous

losses; if not, he does not. The transactions in wheat and other

These transactions are recognised as commercial, but they should not be tolerated by the Board of Trade. They are nothing but gambling, as much so as betting on a horse race or a card. The par ties to these irregular operations are enabled to make combinations, and to advance or depreciate the current prices above or below the actual value; and persons beyoud the city do not feel safe in trusting a market where so many of the sales are bogus, and the quotations give no assurance of the real condition of value. 


