It was difficult to account for thisthe locality was a healthy one -the people were scrupulously clean-the surroundings were properly looked after; and no one could give an intelligent reason why, in one little precinct, such terrible mortality should have occurred. Some one, however, noticed that a certain well in the neighborhood was used by ilmost all the people, and inquiries began to be instituted in regard to it. It was soon found that no person had died who did not use this well. Then an investigation of the well was made, and it was found that it was but a shallow one-six or eight feet deep; that it was contiguous to a house where the Cholera app ared first; that the board facing and brick work of the cess-pools, where the wash and filth of the house were thrown, were broken away, and that thus the virus of the disease, along with the excrementary matter, found its way in sufficient quantities to impregnate the water. The difficulty was remedied, and the Cholera disappeared. 
