ENFRANCHISEMENT OF FREED-The radicals of some of the political schools-especially those under the leadership of such impractical theorists as Frederick Douglass, of Boston, are zealous in their labors to enfranchise the colored race. It seems to us that, to confer upon this class without qualification, the right of infrage, would be, under present circamstances, a very dangerous precedent. Not that we are ungrateful for the services they have rendered the country in its struggles against rebellion, but, it is not the best time to agitate a question so pregnant with elements calculated to excite collision between the two races. For, if we can judge from the temper of the people, such a condition of things would certainly result from the measure. One bold stroke, or the accomplishment of one grand object at a time, ought to be sufficient to gravify the ambition of the most radical: and as slavery in all its hideous aspects has become extinct with the downfall of rebellion, the exasperating agitation of down to a reasonable extent. Let every interest, conflicting or otherwise, growing out of the abolishment of slavery, become harmonized, before other issues are raised of an exciting character. So long as the bond-man has become free-since the shaekles have been stricken from his limbs, and the rights of freedom guaranreed him under the law, let him and his friends forhear until the new condition of civilization entitle the colored man to the votive prerogative. 
