BANKRUPT LAW. There has been introduced into Congress a bill for a general law of bankruptcy throughout the United States .it as "impairing the binding obligation | of contracts."

The bill proposes to give the jurisdicion of all cases under it to the United States courts, who regulate the appointneut and duties of the officers who are to xecute it. In the case of a person who oluntarily applies for its benefits, a sworn chedule of his debts, and names of credtors, together with an inventory of his property must be made, and an assignce the greatest indebtedness, which assignees \$3,063,175. have power to dispose of the property ac cording to their discretion. Operatives, ervants, &e , are to be first paid in full up to fifty dollars, and all dues to the court, State, or United States are placed upon the same footing. The proceedings in a case of bankruptcy, where the creditor forces the debtor into that position, is similar, except in some of the judicial proceedings. After these processes the bankrupt is at liberty to enter into businessagain, freed from the incubus of debt. We doubt the value of all such laws, as they strike a blow at the integrity of the whole eredit system.






