An Ordinance in relation to the Trimming of Trees standing or growing in the Streets, Laues and Alleys of the City of Bridge ton, Passed Feb. 23, 1866.

Section 1, Be it enacted by the Mayor and Common Council of the city of Bridgeton, in Council assembled, That the owners and occupants of all houses and perty on all streets, lanes and alleys of said city shall, between the first day of February and the first day of July of each and every year, cut off all limbs and branches, and trim said trees, to not less than ten feet in height, measuring from the curb or side walk where each tree or trees are standing; and any owner or occupant of said premises neglecting or refusing to comply with this ordinance, then the Mayor or City Council may direct the same to be done, and the said owner or occupant held liable for the expenses, to be recovered in action of debt vith costs, in the name of the Treasurer, before the Mayor or any Justice of the Peace of said city.

Section 2, And be it enacted, That this ordinance shall take effect in twenty days from the date hereof. JAMES HOOD, Mayor,

Be it enacted and ordered by the Mayor and Commor Council of the city of Bridgeton, in Council assembled, That the owners and occupants of all dwelling houses and stores within the of all dwelling houses, shops and stores within the Light District of said city, shall have swept and cleansed all chimneys attached to said dwelling houses, shops and stores, each and every year, subject to the inspection of the Mayor or a committee of the Common Council: and any owner or occupant of the Common Connect: and any owner or occupant of any dwelling house, shop or store neglecting to comply with the provisions of this ordinance shall forfeit five Dollars and costs, to be recovered by action of debt, in the name of the Treasurer, before the Mayor or any Justice of the Peace of said city, for the use of the said corporation.


