Be it enacted by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey, That where hands of a receiver or frustees, appointed under the act to which this is a supplement, is encum-bered with mortgages or other liens, the legality of which is brought in question, and the property is of a character materially to deteriorate in val-

ue pending the litigation thereupon, the Court of Chancery may order such receiver or trustees to sell the same clear of incumbrance, at public of private sale for the best price that can be ed, bringing the money into the court of chancery, there to remain, subject to the same liens and eq-uities of all parties in interest, as was the property before it was sold, and to be disposed of as the said court by its decree shall order and di-2. Be it enacted by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey, That from and after the passage of this act it shall be lawful to charge three dollars per week for keeping in the asylum say pauper or indigent insane person sent to the asylum in accordance with the twentieth, twenty-first and supplement. 2. And be it enacted, That this act shall take effect mmediately.

An act further to provide for the State Reform School. Whereas, the trustees of the New Jersey Reform School report that the sum appropriated for its establishment is insufficient for the purchase of land, the erection of buildings and the various expenditures for furniture, provisions, clothing, and so forth, that will be necessary for the proper accommodation and instruction of the number of boys which they believe will be committed to the school; therefore,

LEGISLATING FOR LABOR. The New York Journal of Commerce, in an article on the value of labor, puts this question to the workingmen, who solicit State laws to regulate the hours of

worth what it produces: The mechanic who builds a boat, or a table or a chair, has no difficulty in determining at what price he will sell the article, or what is its market value. But has he a clear idea that the value of the labor he has expended on it is precisely regulated according to the market va ue of the article? It he has that idea he is certainly strangely at fault in imagining that the Legislature can change the value, of either by law, or that he can ge as much money for eight hours' labor as he can get for ten. Let him ask him-elf this simple question: Can the Legislature by all the laws they may pass, increase the value of a ten dollar chair or a hundred dollar boat? Can they compel the laboring man to pay five dollars for a tool which is worth only four? Recent experience is enough to show the folly of any such idea. The whole power of a government, aided by a tremendous pressure of public opinion, has failed to compel men to take a paper dollar for a gold dollar, or to sell goods for the same number of paper as gold dollars. But if the Legislature cannot make a ten dollar chair worth twelve, how can they make eight hours' labor worth as much as ten? If a chair worth ten dollars in the market takes two days' labor of ten hours each, how can two days' labor of eight hours each on a chair produce ten dollars? We place the statement in this simple form, because it ought thus to be intelligible to every laboring man, and it is important that working men should understand the theory which governs their labor, as it does all other labor. * * * Do the laborers suppose that a man will build as five dollar note into my fist. The question as to how the greatest possible good shall be secured to the greatest possible invit number is one upon which the wisest stateseconomy; recognize it is their deliberations, and design its applications in their enactments. Among the various subjects giving rise to acts of legislation during late years has been that f Teachers' Institutes.

The object of Institutes it would at this late day seem scarcely necessary to explain, yet there are those whom these institutions nearly concern who seem to understand little of fheir importance. In other states more attention has been given to this subject than in our own An educator of experience and ability, in order to show that those held in the state of New York are fully appreciated by its teachers, gives something like the following: "New York had in 1860 over 83 inhabitants to a square mile. New Jersey in the same year nearly 81. The average attendance at Institutes held in the former State, between the years 1859-65, was 157." Those acquainted with the average attendance at our own county Institutes will observe the contrast as to num-

Quoting the exact words of the writer above referred to, he asks: "Will any one tell me why New Jersey, with a population nearly as hickly settled as New York, should have her teachers so little interested in her Institutes If New York, during the six years mentioned, when most of the time her young men were in the ranks of our army, can show an average attendance at each Institute of 157 actual teachers, ought not New Jersey to say to her teachers in this happy season of peace and prosperity-You must come forward, and by earnest, active effort at your associations, your institutes, in your school, and through the press show that you are worthy the positions which your occupy." The spirit that would lead teachers to assemble thus from time to advantage; not for social entertainment, but for intelligent exchange of sentiment; not for a period of time in which relief from usual duties is to be found, but for one of hard and earvantage of all interested in schools to encourage to their utmost. Teachers have sometimes complained that school officers are unwilling to grant them the necessary time, and thus attendance upon these gatherings has been prevented. It would seem both ungenerous and unjust that teachers should thus b deprived of the advantage that ought to arise




