Ordinance No. 13. Ordinance Concerning Nuisances-Passed May 24, 1866.

Passed May 24, 1866.

Be it ordained by the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Bridgeton.

SECTION I. No person shall throw, leave or deposit, or suffer his servant, child or any other person to throw, leave or deposit any dead carcass, carrion, putrid meat, putrid fish, or any offensive, putrid or unwholesome substance whatever, in or upon any street, throw, leave or deposit any dead carcass, carrion, putrid meat, putrid fish, or any offensive, putrid or unwholesome substance whatever, in or upon any street, road, lane or alley, or upon any lot in said city, under the penalty of ten dollars for each offence, to be recovered with costs in an action of debt, in the name of the Treasurer, for the use of said city, before the Mayor or any Justice of the Peace of said city, before the Mayor or any Justice of the Peace of said city.

Section 2. No person shall throw, place or deposit any ashes, vegetables, garbage, dross, cinders, shells, straw, shavings, dirt, dirty water, filth or rubbish of any kind whatever, in any street, road, lane or alley, or public place in said city, under the penalty of two dollars for every offence, to be recovered in an action of debt, with costs, in the name, for the use and in the manner last aforesaid.

Section 3. Any owner or occupant of any lot, house, building, shed, cellar, or place within the said city, who shall suffer the same by neglect to become nauseous or detrimental to the health of the inhabitants of the city, shall forfeit and pay the sum of ten dollars for each offence, to be recovered in an action of debt, with costs, in the name, manner, and for the use aforesaid; and upon conviction thereof the person or persons so offending shall be liable as aforesaid to an additional penalty of ten dollars for every week during which any sitch nuisance shall be suffered to be and remain from and after the date of such conviction.

Section 4. No person shall suffer or permit any on. Szerion 4. No person shall suffer or permit any privy or privy sink or hog pen, upon any lot or pre-mises in said city, owned or occupied by him, to be and remain in such condition, by reason of defective construction or otherwise, as to emit or discharge in

and remain in such condition, by reason of defective construction or otherwise, as to emit or discharge in or upon any adjoining lot or premises, any foul, offensive and nauseous smell, matter or thing, under the penalty of ten dollars for every offence; to be forfeited and paid either by the owner or occupant of the lot or premises upon which such privy, privy sink or hog pen shall be suffered or permitted to be and ramain as aforesaid; to be recovered by action of debt, with costs, in the name, manner and for the use aforesaid; and upon conviction thereof, the person or persons so offending shall be liable as aforesaid to an additional penalty of ten dollars for every week during which any such privy, privy sink or hog pen shall be suffered to remain from and after the date of such conviction.






