RECONSTRUCTION.

The Reconstruction resolutions, as they passed both branches of the Congress have been sent first to the Secretary of State for proper authentication, and from him to the President for transmission to the Governors of the different States.

Mr. Seward has given an official notification that his part has been performed, and the President has done the same. Mr. Seward has simply announced his execution of the law, without any comment whatsoever, but the President has made it the subject of a congressional message, in which, though in courteous and dignified terms, he expresses his opposition.

He insists upon it, that all the rebel States, except Texas, are restored to their rightful condition and entitled to once more representation. He objects, also, to the reference of the question to the legislatures of the States, as those legislatures were not elected upon this direct issue and cannot, he thinks, fairly represent what may be the changes of opinion among the people.

He intimates doubts as to the constitutionality of the amendment, and while complying with the direction of Congress, that the papers should be transmitted, disclaims all responsibility of approval. We presume both Congress and the President are capable of stating all the reasons that influence their course, and therefore we shall not speculate upon the course taken by them both in exact harmony with the principles they profess, and those principles are now before the country for condemnation or approval.

We do not advocate alarm but now is the time for our citizens to take all proper precautions, especially in the use of disinfectants. Chloride of lime should be sprinkled liberally in all impure places.

SOUTH JERSEY INTERESTS.

For many years the people of South Jersey labored under very great disadvantages, such disadvantages, however, as all sections of country labor under when isolated and remote from available markets, and the great agricultural as well as all other interests, were suffered to remain undeveloped to any greater extent than the simple supplying of those necessities which every family required for domestic consumption.

Here, then, is the great secret of this change in the agricultural and progressive character of the people, the construction of railroads and such communications as will enable them to reach a ready market for their goods, whether they be the products of farming, mechanical, or manufacturing skill. And so far as South Jersey is concerned, our people realize that the West Jersey Railroad has given them those advantages which they have so long needed and anxiously desired.

What has brought these mighty changes in the physical condition of the people? What wand has been lifted up to transform a wilderness into a fertile and luxuriant field? What magic power has been employed to strip old Cumberland County of its dead-and-dull foginess, and invest it with new, active and developing energies? We answer boldly and unhesitatingly, the West Jersey Railroad Company. The enterprising gentlemen connected with that road, possessed a far-sighted sagacity, and determined that the interests of South Jersey should no longer suffer from the want of good and sufficient railroads.

The colored people all over the country are still pressing the question of citizenship in the politically equal sense of that term, and in a manner which can not be deemed objectionable. Conventions of the Freedmen are being held in the South to forward this object, and the same plan is being pursued at the North. We are not among those who favor Negro suffrage in opposition to the will of the majority of the people; nor should we object to it if it were to receive such a sanction. Upon this question there are both devoted supporters and opposers.

The Camden Democrat calls the course pursued by Scovel in the legislature a bold and manly one. Bold it certainly was, for he risked a Grand Jury but manly! We respectfully ask for the Camden definition of the term!

RISE IN GOLD.

The financial panic in England together with our own re-trading have produced their natural results and gold has gone up in our country to fifty per cent. So great was the drain upon us that at one time within the last fortnight it touched 70. We cannot but think the Congress to blame somewhat for this state of things. Mr. McCulloch with wisdom and prudent foresight asked the privilege of contracting the currency. There were means, such as exchanging currency for bonds and other ways of doing this, but the pressure of the speculators was too strong, and, honestly we suppose the Congress refused the Secretary the privilege. This left all this abundance of money afloat, and stimulated the importations to an extravagant degree when we had nothing to send across in return except our gold and bonds.

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POLITICS.

It is worth the attention of a close observer, that no other reason than that of management, to watch the political position occupied now by different men, and contrast it with the position occupied by those same men in the days of the past, while at the same time the probable motives influencing those men pass in critical review. Before the war, the two great parties were Republican and Democrat. These were distinguished respectively by adherence to what was termed the non-extension of slavery in the territories of the Union, on the one hand, and the Democrats contended for its admission into those territories until they became States, when they should decide this question for themselves.

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FOURTH OF JULY.

This year Bridgeton seems to be unfortunate in her arrangements for a celebration of our national festival. We have always stood at the head of the list on this subject in this section, and we cannot understand why we should do so now. There is plenty of patriotism in the city, but without efficient direction it is not available. A public meeting was called at the Union Church, and according to the *Patriot* but few of fifteen people attended. Another meeting was called by what purported to be "the party of David Hotel," and no one came to learn that anybody attended that one, and so the matter fell through altogether.

There will be celebrations at Fairton, Newport, Mauriceville, Dorchester and other places in the county. The season has been cold and backward but there is still ample time for nature to give us the weather for the rest of the season to leave us in the Autumn in possession of our average. In the New England States wheat has been very largely injured, though rye, barley, oats, and grass look well. The fruit crop in that section promises a heavy yield.
