Fourth of July Oration. The oration which we print below was delivered on July Fourth in the Com-

"Ninety years have passed away since there was proclamation unto the world that we were a free and independent people. Not yet a hundred years gone by, not yet a century passed, but, what a great and mighty nation have we become How wide our boundaries, how enlarged our domain, how numerous our people,-Truly may we say in the language of holy inspiration : "What hath God wrought?" As it was true of that ancient nation whom God raised up to become his pecu liar people over whom in fraternal love He stretched out his hand in blessingsso of us, God hath blessed. He hath prospered, He hath led onward to greatness. Then to Him let the peans of praise be sung, and the glory and honor

be given. Every people, every race, have their eriods of heroism. When ancient Israel departed from Egypt, and made choice to serve the one true and living God. rather than worship Egyptian idols, and enjoy and delight them in the sensual abundance of the Nilus, that with them was a period of heroism. When the legions of Rome were beaten, and her armies defeated and vanquished, when the great Carthigenian general, with his victorious hosts, was pressing hard upon her gates, and her enemies thought verily her destruction is now near at hand, and the proud city will soon be humbled in the dust, yet, notwithstanding her peril and danger, so great was the confidence of destiny of the eternal City, that the grounds upon which her foe encamped, lost none of their value in the public market.
