



COMMEMORATION AT PENNINGTON

The Pennington Seminary and Female Collegiate Institute, of the Methodist Episcopal Church, under the principality of Rev. D. C. Knowles, has just closed the twenty-fifth year of its existence under circumstances of prosperity.

The exercises at the commencement of the college were of a character gratifying to the lovers of educational advancement.

Dickinson college also, to which we have alluded, has lately held its commencement. Although situated in a portion of the country largely affected by the war, and weighed down by heavy embarrassments of debt, the college still presents a vigorous front, and announces its determination to hold firmly to its position in the education of the young men of the nation.

Mr. Hon. James Harlan, Secretary of the Interior, has resigned his place in the Cabinet, and couched his resignation in the most courteous and manly letter of his kind it has ever been our privilege to read.

Committee on Rebel Atrocity.

The Committee of Congress, to whom was referred the question of the complicity of the leaders of the rebellion with the various barbarous atrocities of the war, have made a partial report of their labors, and the results are sufficient to make the blood run cold as well to excite a feeling of wonderment at the magnanimity of the Congress who with all these facts before them could consent to let these infamous and cold blooded murderers go unwhipped of justice.

These papers show an order from Davis to the effect that all negroes captured in arms should be killed, and all other orders to their generals that the negro troops must not be made prisoners.

Among the statements incorporated into their report is a letter from a southern lady imploring the authorities, not to starve their prisoners, but if they cannot feed them to send them back to Yankee land; and another article from the "sumpter Watchman," which details the condition of the prisons as worse than anything we have yet known.

In reference to the raids upon the border, and the assassination of Mr. Lincoln, Clay is shown to have been the chief agent, while acting under a commission for Jeff Davis in which the object though not specified, are approved.

Papers are found there properly indorsed proposing to blow up the capital at Washington with the entire congress, and asserting that it was already undermined, and these papers are approved by Davis, and other papers are there leaving no shadow of a doubt but that the attempt to introduce the yellow fever among our troops originated or at least possessed the sanction of their dignitaries, and still others in which Vorhees, Ben Wood and others are shown to have been in complicity with the rebellion.

ADJOURNMENT OF CONGRESS. After a long and wearisome session of eight months dealing with questions the most momentous in our history, the national legislature has ceased for the present to exist.

THE WAR IN EUROPE. Since our last, the progress of the war has been rapid and sanguinary. The Austrians after their terrible defeat were defeated again with slaughter, and the last advice brings us accounts of yet another.

THIRTEEN HUNDRED OFFERS REWARD. Governor Ward has offered a further reward of \$800 for the detection and conviction of the person or persons who murdered George Raymond, near Woodbury, on the 15th of August, 1864, for the sum of \$1000 offered by the County, a reward of thirteen hundred dollars.

RIOT AT NEW ORLEANS.

One of those terrible riots so frequent in Southern cities occurred on the 30th inst. in New Orleans. During its progress 37 persons—30 of them colored—lost their lives.

Mr. Grossepain has been a resident of this place about fifteen years, and has contributed largely to the welfare and prosperity of this section of the State.

The riot was finally placed under martial law and quiet ultimately restored. In every aspect of the case all true friends of the South and of the Union must look with horror and regret upon the murderous scenes, which were enacted on the 30th of July an epoch in the history of New Orleans.
