The "Independent" contains an interesting hapter in the life of Stephens. The writer In the year 1825, thirty nine years ago, I ecame a member of the University of Georgia, located at Athens, where I continued some five years, and at length returned to this, my native State. While I was there, Alexander quiet, studious, bright-eyed lad, pious withal. He was furnished the means of education, and preparation for the pulpit. He entered my classes, and I became much interested in him, and greatly pleased with his deportment and progress, and had with him many private walks and familiar conversations. He had

long conversation with him, calling up mem-ories of the past, I inquired about Stephens, and the change of his early plans, adding, "I suppose you know all about it?" "Yes," said he, "I auppose I am as well acquainted with his whole history, and the working of his mind and heart, as any man living." He then proceeded to say that before the completion of his college course, on a deliberate and careful his college course, on a deliberate and careful consideration of the whole subject, he deemed himself better fitted for the law than for theology; for the bar and the rostrum, than the pulpit. He accordingly turned his attention o legal studies, was admitted, gained business and rose rapidly—and the first use he made of his earnings was to refund, principal and in-

terest, the money contributed for his education

He soon came forward in political life, and was at length elected to Congress, since which time his history has become national. was, and I think still is, an elder in the Presbyterian church. 




