They consider themselves as an injured people who by the force of arms have been conquered by a foreign foe, and who only await a favorable opportunity to throw off the yoke. They do not accept the fact that they were the free participants in a united government, but present the plea that they were a distinct nation which has been unjustly conquered, and which will never be in possession of its rights until the yoke is broken from their necks. There is not the first exhibition of penitence,-not the first acknowledgment of wrong-not the first expression of gratitude for the magnanimity with which they have been treated, but a simple, sullen defiance, coupled with an insolent demand for their rights under the Constitution. and an entire ignoring of the fact that their rebellion was a crime, which in any way interfered with those rights. To all this is added the open avowal that they only desire the exercise of their power in the Union for the purpose of accomplishing through political means the separation which they failed to accomplish through war. We have looked in vain among all their organs for one which expresses a different sentiment, and we cannot look upon this state of things among them without serious alarm. They are desperate and vindictive from their losses, and with the sentiment conto watch the moment when they can cut loose with safety from the Union, they are in a condition which must make us wary in according to them the power to use the sentiments which they so openly avow. In this light and in this light only is it possible to explain their hostility to the Constitutional Amendments proposed by Congress.

Their demand for a representation in Congress which shall double that accorded to the North, is in itself presumptuous for, except as the Congressional magnanimity may confer the elective tranchise upon them, there is no man in the South that engaged in the rebellion or aided it: who possesses the right at all. Hard as it is to the feelings of the Southern people to accept their position, still it is true that the laws place them in exactly the case of a man who has forfeited these rights by the basest crime. It places them upon the level of bigamists, robbers and murderers. Treason is no more honorable than burglary or murder, and the commission of the crime deprives both alike of the privilege of voting. But they do not recognize this. They boldly insist upon it that they have committed no crime and forfeited no right. That their treason is no crime and may be repeated at any time with no other possible consequences than result from failure. The abolition of slavery; under the former system of representation, existing before the war, increases largely their representation. Under ordinary circumstances they would not care for this for no larger representation is needed than the population demands, that is, if they expect to remain integral parts of the Union. But if they do not so intend, then every Congressional vote becomes a matter of the greatest importance, for at any moment when by any alliance with others they can secure the necessary number of national legislators, the Union can be peacefully dissolved. 




