DEATH OF COM. ROBERT FIELD STOCKTON. "Things of the noblest kind his genius drew; And looked through nature at a single view; A loose he gave to his unbounded seni), And taught new land to rise, new sens to roll."

On Wednesday the tenth day of October 1866, the citizens of Princeton were called upon to perform the solemn duty of committing to the silence of the grave the last mortal remains of the revered and honored statesman and hero, Commodore Robert Flerb Stockton. Never, perhaps, in the history of that beautiful borough, did a deeper and more profound solemold, light-hearted youth and hoavy age, the man of toil and the man of wealth, all shared alike in the general sorrow that prevailed.— Business of all kinds was suspended, bells were rolled, and the countenances of the citizens indicated that a great and important but sad event had occurred. And so, indeed, there all its details and bearings. No thong of the cial and private life, in the councils of the nation, and on the forum, had passed from among them, and they were now paying their last sad silent respect to his memory! Heads were bowed in reverential submission to the man-date that summoned so honored and so worthy a man, and hearts were stricken that had never before been seriously impressed with the terrible calamity of death. Besides the relatives and mourners who had gathered to the scene of sorrow, there were manifestations of as deep and poignant anguish as ever saddened an appreciative community. And this sorrow was real—for, in the same house where Commodore Stockton, acventy-one years ago, had first breathed the elements of life, on the old "Marven Estate," surrounded with all its hallowed associations—in the bosom of his family. lowed associations—in the bosom of his family, and in the midst of weeping and auxious these noble traits of character, and with these friends, the vital spark went out, leaving a co-operative relations between commander blank that time can never fill. Thus the spirit that gave tangibility to the acts and characteristic of the deceased came and departed in the hallowed spot. What grand and lofty achievements—what notle performances of duty—what daring enterprises—what exhibitions of christian charity—what devotion to State and National interests—what falthful domestic attachments and all the crowning virtues of a great, good and true man, gem the diadem of glory that encircles his name and memory!

Surrounded with hallowed associations and inspiring scates. inspiring scenes, the mind of Commodore Stockton, naturally of a rigorous and active character, was early impressed with a high sense of exalted duty. On his own homestead he had heard the story of his ancestors' struggle in

"If glory was a bate that angels awallow'd,
How should souls allied to sense resist it?"
But he could not resist! The deeds of his fore-fathers shed around his young and ambitions spirit a halo of inspiration which increased in power as his years advanced, until burning with emotions of irresistable patriotiem, he resolved to go forth in his country's service and win a name that should shine as onspicuously on the tablets of his country's nistory as those which had already been placed there by deeds of heroic bravery. With this laudible impulse to his ambition he was doubly






