THE WET BASIN BILL. A GOOD LAW.

The constant and rapid increase of crime caused by the indiscriminate sale and use of intoxicating liquors has become so great and alarming that the friends of umanity have sought for legislative interference towards remedying the evils. A bill has been presented to the Legislature by Hon. Geo. T. Cobb, supplementary to the "Act to describe, apprehend and punish disorderly persons. It provides that, in case any person shall be convicted before two justices of the peace of being a common drunkard, and shall be proved to neglect or refuse to take proper care of his family by reason of such drunkenness, such justices shall issue an order directed to the Overseer of the Poor of such township in which conviction shall be had, warning all persons who traffic in intoxicating liquors to desist from selling such liquors to such convicted persons. It is made the duty of the Overseer of the Poor to serve a copy of said order upon all dealers in that article from whom said convicts would be likely to procure such liquors, and also the development made, that while we to post up in three of the most public places in the township a copy of said order. Any distiller inn-keeper, grocer or other person, who, having received a copy of such notice, shall in any manner sell or furnish to such convict, or any member of his family, any liquor, shall pay a fine of ten dollars for each offence. Any inn-keeper, gracer, or distiller who shall sell or furnish to any habitual drunkard any intoxicating liquors, and shall take in pledge from him any clothing or any article of food, provision or household goods necessary for the comfort or support of said drunkard or his family, shall be deemed guilty of a disorderly act and be prosecuted against in the manner
