Only \$2.00 per Year JAMES B. FERGUSON. Editor. REV. CHARLES H. WHITECAR. For thirty years past this gentleman has been engaged in the regular itinerant work of the Methodist ministry, the last five years of which has been passed in our midst, first as a pastor of Commerce St. Church, and afterward as Presiding Elder of the Bridgeton district. To look at his frame, lithe and agile, springy and elastic-his noble features glowing with the freshness of apparent youth - the sparkle of his eye, full of joyous spirit, one would scarcely believe him to be over thirty-five years of age and indeed it is only from the tell tale threads of silver in his hair that it becomes possible to assign him fifty winters. He was born in our state and is descended from some of its oldest Methodistic stock, although his parents removed at a very early period of his life to the city of Philadelphia, where he grew up under the purest influences of a pious home superadded to the training of the Sabbath school. He professed a religious experiente and connected himself with the church while yet a mere youth, thus throwing the safeguards of religion around his boyish days. His friends, who were engaged in business avocations in the city destined him for a mercantile life, but God had other work for him to do and his mind was soon impressed with the necessity of devoting his attention to the ministry of the gospel. The church, impressed with his earnest piety, gifts of speaking and brilliant oratory, recognized the call and licensed him to preach. Soon after this he was recommeded to the Philadelphia Annual Conference, and admitted by that body at the very early age that we have indicated . His first appointment was to Warren circuit then comprehending the larger part of Warren county, together with a portion of Sussex.' This was well calculated to try his endurance. The rides were long-the country mountainous and broken—the people primitive in their habits - the resources for comfort slender compared with those of the city -the pay scarcely reached a hundred dollars a year; but these things were not only accepted without a murmer, but his youthful elasticity of nerve turned them was about this period that the experiment of "young mens' appointments" began to be tried among the Methodists, and although it was thought to be taking a large risk to place so young a man in charge of a society, yet, he was appointed the succeeding year to Mendham, where his ministry was fairly successful. After this a year was spent as agent for Dickinson college. In this capacity he traveled over all parts of the state and acquired a reputation as a public speaker, which placed him in the front rank of the preachers At the close of this year he was placed in charge of the society at Jersey City, then numbering about seventy members. The town was almost a marsh-the church editice was set upon piles, there was no parsonage, and it was with difficulty that a house could be procured for the accommodation of the pastor and his wife. There was no church of his denomination nearer than Newark, and for many miles in other directions - a region that is now studded with vigorous churches. At the close of his term here he was transferred to Trenton, where his fervid eloquence attracted large numbers of the community, and where he was permitted to receive over seven hundred persons into the church. His next appointment was Halsey St. Newark. This church had been sadly rent by the Millerite controversy and it required the most judicious administration to restore its prosperity, an administration in which he had the pleasure of being successful. From there he went to Franklin street in the same city, a compliment only paid to strong ability In a revival occurring here he received two hundred and forty members into the church and left it greatly strengthened. The next charge was Burlington. A subscription had been started by Rev. Mr. Ashbrook, his predeces-or, toward the erection of a new church edifice, and under the pastorate of Mr. Whitecar the present Broad St. church was carried to a successful completion. From here he was stationed at Camden, at that time all in one pastorate. At the close of this term he was transferred to the New York East Conference and stationed at Allen street in the city of New York. Here his pulpit powers attracted large audiences, and five hundred people have been known to go away unable to obtain admittance. In connection with his efforts there, some ten thousand dollars were raised in the congregation and applied to the improvement


